

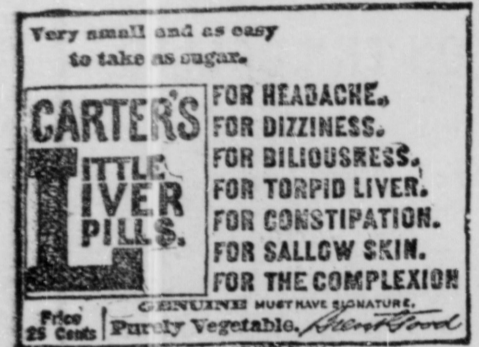

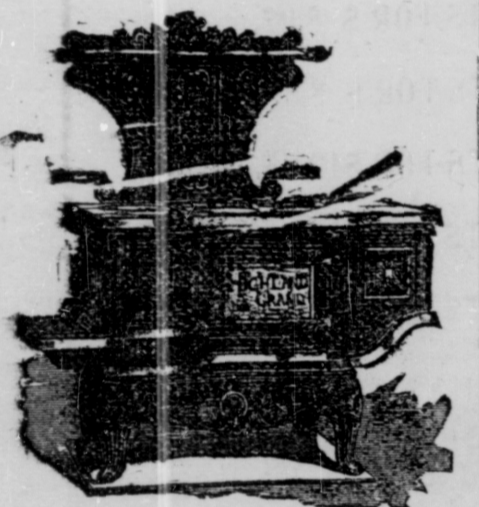

### KINKORA MEETING.

One of the largest and best political meetings held at Kinkora for years past took place on Friday night, Mr. Thomas McCabe in the chair. Mr. Bell, who attended alone, spoke first, for an hour, in an apologetic sort of way, and received a courteous hearing from the fair-minded electors of Kinkora and elsewhere. He was followed by Mr. Lefargey in an able speech, exposing the failure of the Government to perform a single one of their pledges or benefit any industry in the country. On the other hand he showed that they had imposed unheard-of burdens on the people. Mr. Lefargey was greeted with applause, and from the tone of this and the other meetings held will carry the riding of East Prince by a large majority. Stirring addresses were also delivered by Messrs J. P. Trainor, A. C. Saunders, Peter McCourt and J. J. Bradley, after which Mr. Bell was given an hour to reply to the opposition speakers. The meeting broke up with three rousing cheers for Mr. Lefargey and three for the Conservative party.
