

J.E. (Larry) Trainor Dies In Hospital At 78

J.E. (Larry) Trainor, who for many years was inspector of weights and measures for this province passed away Monday at the Charlottetown Hospital. He had been ill for approximately six weeks.

Mr. Trainor was 78 years old and he is survived by his wife, brother William, Charlottetown, and two sisters, Mrs. Robert Elliot, Dorchester, Mass., and Mrs. Layton Moore, Lynchburg, Virginia.

Mr. Trainor is known from Tignish to Souris, not only because of his former government duties which took him all over the province, but as a staunch supporter of the Canadian Legion, and a very ardent horseman and follower of sports in general.

Old guard veterans of the First World War, remember "Larry" as the Sergeant Major of the Artillery Unit which Colonel D.L. MacKinnon took overseas. After the first world war, conflict and between the two wars, Mr. Trainor served on the executive of the Canadian Legion, and was one of that devoted band of ex-servicemen who helped to raise the Legion to the position of esteem in the community.

MANY FRIENDS

After returning from overseas Mr. Trainor became inspector of weights and measures and in that capacity he met and became good friends with people all over the Island. Mr. Trainor remained in government service until his retirement 13 years ago. Since his retirement he was very active in the work of the Royal Canadian Legion. He is a past president of the Charlottetown Branch and for the past four years he has been honorary president of Charlottetown Branch No. 1. He was also an active member of the Knights of Columbus.

For many years, Mr. Trainor marshalled the Remembrance Day Parade, and his fine military appearance always added to the occasion. He has always been prominent in sport, and one of those who contributed greatly to the success of junior hockey, when the juniors of Charlottetown were competing

for Maritime and Dominion championships. He is also a great lover of horses, and very few meets were held anywhere in the province, without Larry being in attendance.

Mr. Trainor was described by a close friend of his, who said, "he was a fine fellow, well thought of as a soldier and in his career. Larry was trained soldier of the old school," the friend said.

The remains are resting at the Hennessey Funeral Home until Thursday at nine a.m. when they will be transferred to St. Dunstan's Basilica for Requiem High Mass. Interment will take place in the Catholic Cemetery.

Members of the Legion and the Knights of Columbus will attend in a body. The Legion will conduct its service at the graveside.

City Police Will Patrol At Memorial

Chief of Police Sterns Webster said yesterday the force will augment Confederation Centre officials in patrolling the Centre area in an all-out effort to curb vandalism at the property.

Among recent acts of vandalism at the Centre was the breaking of one of the specially designed windows set in the roof of Memorial Hall. This has been particularly costly as both workmen and materials had to be brought to the province to repair it.

Chief Webster said the area would be patrolled by the force day and night and especially during weekends. He said he had been authorized to offer a reward of \$20 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those responsible for vandalism.

Selected people from the Experimental Farm and a half dozen government departments and institutions are attending a four-day short course in microscopy and photomicrography which is being conducted in Birch Court, Experimental Farm, this week.

The course is being given by Stanley Klosevych, FRMS who is with the bio-graphic unit at Ottawa.

The course was opened officially Tuesday morning by R.C. Parent, director of the experimental farm here. It runs until Friday at noon.

Attending in addition to scientists and other employees at the Experimental Farm, are people from the Canada Department of Fisheries, the fisheries research boat at Ellerslie; Prince of Wales College; the division of laboratories, provincial department of health; and the divisions of laboratories from the Charlottetown Hospital and the Prince County Hospital, from the plant protection division, Canada department of agriculture and St. Dunstan's University.

Noted Baptist Speaker Visits Island Churches

Rev. W.D. Jackson of London, England, will speak at the following Baptist churches: on May 2 at Charlottetown, 11 a.m. and O'Leary 7.30 p.m.; on May 3 at East Point at 8 p.m.; on May 5, at Clyde River 8 p.m. and on May 6th, in Summerside 8 p.m.

Dr. Jackson, captain in field artillery in World War I, graduate of Bristol University, once a famous football player, has held pastorates in Norfolk, England, Melbourne, Australia and London. He was president of the Baptist Union of Great Britain and Ireland.

He has travelled widely in Europe including Norway, Switzerland, Italy, France and Belgium. He gave the keynote address at the Baptist World Alliance Congress in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in 1960 and the devotional addresses at the Atlantic Baptist Convention in Wolfville in 1964.

At the present time Dr. Jackson is, by invitation, on a speaking tour of the Atlantic Provinces.

Chaplains' Mar. Conference Opens With 25 Attending

Twenty-five chaplains from all over the Maritime provinces are in Charlottetown attending the Sixth Annual Maritime chaplain's conference.

Those attending are from all of the armed services, penal institutions, universities and hospitals. Yesterday afternoon they heard a talk by Dr. R.G. Forsythe, medical superintendent of Riverside Hospital. This was followed by a panel discussion of "Hospital Chaplaincy Patterns".

Just before dinner there was a session on business, evaluation and planning for the 1966 conference.

This will be followed by lunch and a tour of the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Complex.

Mr. Logan pointed out that before the Licensed Assistants Program was established, it was necessary in the nursing service field, for hospitals to employ ward aides. These for the most part, were girls who had had no experience in a hospital, and who had to be trained by an in-service apprenticeship method, he said.

While many of these girls adopted themselves to the hospital environment and to their duties, their instructional course was seldom conducted in a standardized or uniform line, he continued.

"This meant, of course, that the directors of nursing and the nursing supervisors could never be completely sure as to the ward aides' qualifications in a variety of situations, and so being in doubt, it probably happened in a good many instances, that registered nurses were utilized when they were not necessarily needed for the job at hand."

New By-Law Will Regulate Town Building

MONTAGUE — A special meeting of the Montague Town Council was held Friday evening to give third reading to a by-law to regulate building within the town limits.

The new by-law requires all persons building, renovating, or locating any structure or mobile home to first obtain a permit from the town clerk.

It is the intention of the council to prevent the erection of any structure or mobile home within the town limits that does not in their opinion conform to or improve the appearance of the general area.

Although regulations did exist previously the council felt they did not cover sufficiently and had not necessarily been enforced in line with the overhauling of the by-laws it was felt this change should be made, and the new by-law is now in force.
