Third District Kings PC Ass'n Holds Annual

MONTAGUE—Prince Edward Island has taken a new lease on life according to Premier Walter E. Shaw who spoke at the annual meeting of the third district Kings Progressive Conservative association held in Cardigan last evening before a group of about 35 representatives of the district.

"Never in the history of the province have we had such progressive development as is going on at the present time in the field of education, agriculture and fisheries," stated Premier Shaw. All these things have risen to a higher level under this government he pointed out.

"Although we are not able to build all the roads we would like we are doing so on an equitable basis," he touched on Georgetown, Montague and Morell industrial development saying it is impossible to realize the full significance of this undertaking.

Speaking of the causeway, he said the present federal government left his government without knowledge of what is going on. "If the railway is not included this will mean its end. As this may happen we have been studying the feasibility of a winter road. This could mean a tremendous change in transportation but until further study on this policy has been formulated on this matter," he said.

There have been great changes in government in the past few years, the problem of government grants, the difficulty in getting through to Ottawa on these grants and other matters were not as easy one, he advised.

OLBIA, Sardinia (AP) — Unidentified reports Wednesday night said Princess Margaret and her husband, the Earl of Sardinia, were shipwrecked Wednesday but reached shore safely.

The reports said Margaret, sister of Queen Elizabeth, reached shore in a dinghy after a yacht owned by the Aga Khan struck a rock.

The accident is reported to have taken place near the island of Mortorio, north of Sardinia, where the princess is spending a three-week holiday. Reports of the incident came from a number of employees of the Aga Khan.

The Aga could not be reached for comment. Neither could Princess Margaret nor her husband. They have been vacationing in Sardinia as his guests.

The reports of the incident said this account:

The motor launch Amalun was skirting the island of Mortorio in the early afternoon. It was moving close to shore when it ran against a rock and ground to a halt.

The rock caused a hole in the side of the vessel and it began taking water.

The passengers put on life jackets and got into the small lifeboat.

The boat landed on Mortorio where they waited until another boat came and took them back to Porto Cervo.

The Amalun was towed back to Porto Cervo for repairs.
