

Angels Defeat Orioles; Twins Shut Out Detroit

ANAHEIM (AP)—California Angels snapped Baltimore Orioles' streak in the first inning Sunday en route to a 6-1 victory over the American League champions.

Phoebeus had thrown shutouts in his two major league appearances prior to Sunday.

California scored before Phoebeus could retire a batter Sunday.

Singles by Jose Cardenal, Charlie Vinson, Bubba Morton and Bobby Knoop brought in two more runs in the fourth and Vinson capped the scoring in the eighth with his first major league homer—a three-run blast off reliever Eddie Fisher.

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Tony Oliva's 25th homer broke up a brilliant pitching duel between Jim Kaat of the Twins and Detroit's Earl Wilson, giving Kaat his 25th victory of the season.

Kaat, 25-11, scattered four hits while Wilson, 18-11, allowed five before Oliva connected.

NEW YORK (AP)—Steve Whitaker and Bill Bryan slammed successive home runs in the second inning, giving New York Yankees a 3-1 victory over Boston Red Sox Sunday.

Whitaker led off against loser Hank Fischer with his seventh homer and Bryan followed with his fourth. The Yankees added a run in the seventh on a walk, Bobby Murcer's single and a sacrifice fly.

Boston scored in the fifth against winning pitcher Jim Bouton when Joe Foy's two-out double drove in a run.

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Bases-loaded singles by pinch hitter Chico Salmon and Max Alvis around Vic Davalillo's sacrifice fly keyed a three-run rally in the ninth that lifted Cleveland Indians past Kansas City Athletics 4-2 Sunday.

Jim Nash checked the Indians on six hits and one unearned run until the ninth, when he walked Joe Azcue and was yanked by manager Alvin Dark.

Chuck Hinton doubled off reliever Bill Edgerton, Rocky Col-

avillo drew an international walk, filling the bases, and Salmon tied the score 2-2 with a single to right off Jack Aker.

Davalillo's sacrifice fly lent the Indians ahead and Alvis capped the rally with a run-scoring single.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Hank Allen's sixth hit of the day, a run-scoring single in the 11th, brought Washington a 2-1 victory over Chicago White Sox and a sweep of a doubleheader Sunday.

Allen collected four straight hits in Washington's 6-4 opening-game triumph.

Fred Valentine singled with one out in the Senators' 11th in the nightcap, stole second and one out later scored as Allen singled.

Duane Josephson singled home Chicago's run in the first inning, but his wild throw in the fourth inning allowed Tim Lincecum to tie the game.

Jim King's two-run homer in the first inning was the only extra base blow of 15 hits by the Senators in the opener.

MAHA Asks CAHA For Rule Changes

HALIFAX (CP)—The Maritime Amateur Hockey Association will ask its parent body, the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, to approve a resolution which would permit all junior teams under MAHA jurisdiction to use four imported players.

The four-import recommendation was passed at the annual meeting of the MAHA here Saturday.

However members upheld a resolution which restricts junior teams to the use of only two imports while engaged in MAHA playoffs.

The Maritime Hockey Referees Association will have a voting delegate at future MAHA meetings. The referees submitted a resolution asking for four

voting delegates but the number was cut to one, who will be the chairman of the MHA.

The referees will also get a greater say in the re-instatement of suspended players. The MAHA president will confer with the MHA president before any suspensions are lifted.

The association also voted approval for a resolution calling for armed forces clubs to be allowed a maximum of five replacements in any season to offset losses through the transfer of player personnel.

Representatives of junior clubs and leagues requested the MAHA to call a special meeting in the spring of 1967 to enable junior officers to consider resolutions scheduled to come before the annual meeting of the CAHA later in the spring.

Minor hockey representatives recommended the establishment of a body in Nova Scotia to control the minor hockey program; the formation of a committee to survey the province's program and recommend changes—and a study of the refereeing situation as it applies to minor hockey.

Jack Christie of Toronto, minor hockey director for the CAHA, said 14 mid-level teams from across Canada are expected to participate in the week-long Canadian Centennial Mid-level Championships in Kingston, Ont., during the coming hockey season.

He raced here first as a two-year-old and has been here continuously since, under the same ownership. Presentation of a cooler was made as a farewell gift to the horse who had been popular with race fans. He wound up his career by placing third in both starts. His driver was Harry Poulton.

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Chicago Drops L.A. 2-1; Atlanta Whips Pittsburgh

CHICAGO (AP)—Rookie Ken Holtzman pitched no-hit ball for eight innings and finished with a two-hitter as Chicago Cubs edged the National League-leading Los Angeles Dodgers and Sandy Koufax 2-1 Sunday.

Holtzman, a rookie southpaw who starts his senior year at the University of Illinois today, permitted just one base runner—Dick Schofield on a walk on a 3-2 count in the third—before Schofield ruined the no-hit bid by rapping a single over second base in the ninth.

After Schofield's single, pinch hitter Al Ferrara walked. Holtzman struck out pinch hitter Jim Gilliam, but Maury Wills singled Schofield home.

The 20-year-old Holtzman then got Willie Davis to line to Glenn Beckert, who stepped on second for a game-ending double play.

ATLANTA (AP)—Two home runs by Hank Aaron and one by Macek Jones, plus clutch relief pitching by Clay Carroll, carried Atlanta Braves to a 5-2 victory over Pittsburgh Pirates Sunday.

The loss cost the second-place Pirates a chance to move to within one-half game of the National League-leading Los Angeles Dodgers, who lost to Chicago Cubs 2-1. Instead the Pirates remained 1 1/2 games back.

Aaron broke a scoreless duel between Atlanta's Dick Kelley and Tommie Sisk of Pittsburgh when he led off the fourth with

his 41st homer. Sisk then walked Rico Cartly, and Jones followed with his 21st homer.

SET HOMER RECORD Aaron hit his 42nd homer leading off a three-run eighth. That gave the Braves a team record of 200 homers in a season. The old mark of 199 was reached in 1957 when the Braves won the pennant.

The Pirates had cut Atlanta's lead to 3-1 and had runners on first and second with one out in the eighth when Carroll replaced Kelley.

Roberto Clemente, who had hit his 28th homer in the sixth, reached first on Denis Menke's error, loading the bases. Carroll then got Donn Clendenon to force Clemente at second, with one run-scoring pinch hitter Willie Stargell grounded out, ending the threat.

Carroll retired the Pirates without trouble in the ninth.

HOUSTON (AP)—Bob Aspromonte's run-scoring single in the sixth gave Houston Astros a 5-4 victory over San Francisco Giants Sunday.

Despite the loss, the third-place Giants remained four games behind the Los Angeles Dodgers, who lost to Chicago 3-1.

Willie McCovey's 34th homer, a two-run blast in the top of the sixth, tied the game 4-4, but the Astros took the lead again in their half of the inning.

Pinch hitter Aaron Pointer started the rally with a single, went to second on Bill Heath's single and scored as Aspromonte singled off Lindy McDaniel, who had replaced Billy Hoft.

The Astros' first three runs were unearned, the result of dropped balls by Willie Mays and McCovey.

CINCINNATI (AP)—Ron Swoboda's single produced the go-ahead run in the sixth and New York Mets went on to defeat Cincinnati Reds 8-4 Sunday.

Second game of the scheduled

doubleheader was postponed because of rain.

The Mets bounced back from a 3-0 deficit by scoring four runs in the sixth and three in the seventh. Swoboda, Cleon Jones, Jim Hickman and Greg Goosen knocked in two runs apiece for New York.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Rich Allen's run-scoring single with two out in the 13th gave Philadelphia Phillies a 4-3 victory over St. Louis Cardinals Sunday.

Cookie Rojas singled off Cardinal reliever Nelson Briles with one out, but was forced at second by John Callison. Dick Groat then beat out an infield hit and Allen singled to center, scoring Callison with the winning run.

Allen also drove in the tying run in the ninth with a single and crashed his 40th homer in the fourth.
