Keir Clark said that the increasing interest in the Music Festival was having a profound effect on the educational and cultural life of the Island, especially in the life of the young people. He said then he would propose that an election be held early in June. His second first will be making his second election entry as leader of his party. He took over in 1949 after George Drew resigned to become national leader of the party. Under his leadership the Progressive Conservative party was re-elected Nov. 22, 1951, with the greatest legislative majority in the province's history. It captured 79 of the 90 seats then in stake. Liberals won seven CCF two, Liberal-Labor one and the Labor - Progressive (Communist) party one. Five by-elections have been held since then with Progressive Conservatives winning all of them. At dissolution the government held 78 seats. Liberals six and two were vacant. Others were unchanged. Redistribution will raise the number of seats to 98 in the June election. The Liberals will be headed by Farquhar Oliver a Grey county farmer and veteran of 29 years in provincial politics. Mr. Oliver, elected to the legislature at the age of 22, was chosen party leader last year as successor to Walter C. Thomson. Donald C. MacDonald, a former newspaper man and school teacher, will be entering his first election as CCF provincial leader. Mr. MacDonald, formerly of Ottawa, was national organizer and treasurer of the CCF party.

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Conviction Amended In Potato Marketing Case

Mr. Justice G. J. Tweedy yesterday amended the conviction against Messrs. Simmons and MacFarlane, potato dealers of Summerside, handed down by Stipendiary-Magistrate R. S. Hinton recently, for that firm's having engaged in the marketing of potatoes without a license. The Magistrate had imposed a fine of five hundred dollars and had ordered the firm of Simmons and MacFarlane to pay to Donald A. MacDonald, chairman of the Potato Marketing Board, the sum of fifty-two dollars and fifty-five cents as costs. Mr. Justice Tweedy modified the fine to two hundred dollars and disallowed the costs of the previous trial but ordered that the costs of the trial before His Lordship—thirty-five dollars—be paid by the Potato Marketing Board. The Court judgment yesterday was on the writ of certiorari. Yesterday afternoon Mr. J. O. C. Campbell, as counsel for the applicant, filed an appeal against the original conviction on its merits, on the following grounds: (1) that the Potato Marketing Board had no power to make the order which a violation is charged; (2) that the Stipendiary Magistrate did not permit witnesses to exercise their rights under Section 6 of the Evidence Act; (3) that evidence of matters that took place in Queens County was improperly admitted; (4) that the conviction was against the evidence. No date has yet been set for the hearing of this appeal, which if granted, will involve a retrial of the case.

Conviction Amended In Potato Marketing Case

The Respondent in answer to said motion maintains that there is nothing wrong with the information or conviction. In my opinion, the information should give a concise and legal description of the offence charged. It must include every ingredient required by the Statute to constitute the offence. Particularly is this so when there are several definitions of the word "Dealer" in the Board Order in question and certain exceptions with regard to Dealers in said Board Order. While it may be true that during the course of the hearing the evidence established that the Applicant was a "Dealer", referred to in the Board Order, who committed an offence against the Act, yet I feel this should have been alleged in the first instance. More so, when objection was taken to the form of the information by the Applicant at the earliest opportunity. As to the propriety of proceeding by way of Certiorari, rather than appeal, I am not going to make any comments. There is a maze of cases supporting both procedures. Following the practice laid down by His Lord the Chief Justice in Re Richards, 18 M.P.R. 190-207, this case appears to me to be one which falls within the intent of section 683 of the Criminal Code and section 12 of The Habeas Corpus and Certiorari Act, P.E.I. Statutes, Cap. 70. Applying the imported curative powers of section 727 of the Criminal Code, the Court orders that the Conviction be amended so as to show that the Applicant was a Dealer within the meaning of the Board Order; that the Conviction then be confirmed but that the sentence be modified as follows: 'The said Applicant for its said offence to forfeit and pay the sum of two hundred dollars. The costs ordered by the Stipendiary Magistrate be disallowed. The Applicant to have against the prosecutor the general costs of this application which are hereby fixed at thirty-five dollars. Conviction Amended In Potato Marketing Case

Following is the text of the judgment by Mr. Justice Tweedy on the writ of certiorari: The Applicant was convicted before Richard S. Hinton, Q.C., Stipendiary Magistrate for Prince County, as appears from the Record of Conviction: 'for that he the defaulter between the 1st day of December, 1954, and the 6th day of January A.D. 1955 at or near Summerside in Prince County in the said province unlawfully did violate an order made with reference to the marketing of potatoes an agricultural product by the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board (as authorized by the provisions of the Marketing Act R.S. P.E.I. 1951, Chapter 90, and an order of the Governor-in-Council of Canada made under the provisions of The Agricultural Products Marketing Act (Canada), 13 George VI, First Section Chapter 16, by engaging in the marketing of potatoes without a Dealer's Licence from said Board, on the prosecution of Donald A. MacDonald, chairman of the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board. 'And adidge the defaulter for its said offence to forfeit and pay the sum of five hundred dollars to be paid and applied according to law, and also to pay to the said Donald A. MacDonald the sum of fifty-two dollars and fifty-five cents for his costs on this behalf.' The applicant now applies for a writ of Certiorari to remove into this Court said conviction on the ground that the said conviction and information, whereon the same is based discloses no offence in that the Applicant accused is not therein stated to be a dealer within the meaning of the Potato Marketing Act, this being a ground of objection taken at the outset of the trial whereon the said conviction is based.

Conviction Amended In Potato Marketing Case
