Three Types Of Hotel Skips Are Reported By Managers

TORONTO (CP) — Now the summer holiday season is over, hotel managers are totting up their profits—and, on the red side of the ledger, their losses to "skips."

People who sneak away without paying their bills are of three sorts, says Joe Garshon, president of the Toronto Hotel Credit Managers' Association. There are real professionals

during the busy season and credit managers are continually amazed by their nerve.

TOOK SIX ROOMS

A large Toronto hotel reported the case of a skip who left one room in the hotel, went downstairs and registered for another room.

He repeated this operation five times, using different names with different clerks.

It wasn't until the room clerks exchanged notes that they realized they were dealing with the same man.

But the life of a skip is not an easy one. Hotels have their own methods for dealing with the cagey check-out men.

Maids and bellhops report on a guest's clothing and luggage. If it is cheap, it could mean the man is a skip, willing to leave his clothes behind in favor of a hasty retreat.

When a bill reaches \$50 with no payment in sight, the guest's registration card is checked to see if he is known to the hotel. The next check—a lot more thorough—comes when the bill reaches \$100.

The guest is telephoned by the

credit manager and courteously asked how he intends paying his bill. The credit manager also asks if the guest has a credit card or a bank courtesy card.

It's all part of the job for the credit manager, who must "get

tough" rather than run the risk of finding an empty room with no clue as to the skip's identity.
