Division Of Aid Society Funds To Orphanages

The Childrens Aid Society of this city which was organized in 1909, ceased to exist in August last. The last meeting was presided over by the late Rev. G. C. Webster, president. At that meeting it was decided to divide its funds amounting to nearly \$5,000 equally between the two orphanages. To do this it was found necessary to have an amendment made to the Childrens Protection Act. Such an amendment was passed at the last meeting of the Legislature, and as called for in the amendment the funds of the Society were on Thursday turned over to the Provincial treasurer for distribution to the orphanages to be added to their Endowment funds. The minute books, records and other documents were handed into the office of the Minister of Welfare, as directed by the amendment above referred to. Thus has passed out of existence an organization which for many years did much for the protection and welfare of over two hundred children who were made its wards by the courts.
