The Unlatched Door

Dr. Chivers hurried out, and a few seconds later the camera and finger-print men came in. Insp. Kenway set them to work, and began a quick but detailed examination of the room. He had noticed from the first that there was no sign of disorder anywhere.

Rev. Horace MacEwen Returns To Province

Rev. Horace F. MacEwen, a minister of the Bible Presbyterian Church, has recently arrived in Charlottetown with his wife and family after a three year sojourn in the West. He has preached in the Church of Scotland here, and will be remembered as the originator of "The Church of Scotland Hour" broadcast from Summerside, where he did much to collect the indigenous religious music of Prince Edward Island. He will be heard from Charlottetown in a series of broadcasts of masterpieces of piano music on Monday evenings at 9.30 P. M.

Although Mr. MacEwen considers the preaching of the gospel his primary calling, he has never lost touch with his art. Before his conversion and call to the ministry he had an outstanding musical career. A graduate and post-graduate of the Julliard School of Music in New York City, he taught professionally in the metropolitan area and was a concert pianist as well as organist at the First Reformed Episcopal Church there.

He has given recitals and appeared as soloist in many American and Canadian cities. In 1945 he was chosen as soloist on Toronto's Northern Electric Hour to represent this Island on Prince Edward Island night. This was a series of broadcasts in which each of the provinces was featured in success.

During his pastorate at the Bible Presbyterian Church in Edmonton he gave five broadcasts over the Western network of the C. B. C.

In the fall of 51, due to a setback in health he resigned his Edmonton charge and spent the winter in Vancouver. In both of these cities he and Mrs. MacEwen, who is a musician in her own right, were often heard in joint public performances. In the latter city Mr. MacEwen instructed a class in the Psalms at the Free Church of Scotland.

Mrs. MacEwen is a graduate of the Julliard School of Music and has taught in the New York area for many years. In 1937, one of her pupils was a gold medal winner in the New York Music Festival and was presented in recital at Carnegie Hall. She will appear with Mr. MacEwen in a subsequent series of broadcasts of piano ensemble music in the near future.

The MacEwen household is a musical one with three of the four children now being instructed. Paul R. Faith 6, and Eunice Hope 4, do their daily practicing. Paul was awarded a \$50.00 scholarship at the Edmonton Music Festival last summer on the basis of outstanding talent, and proved himself again this winter when he tied for second place in a city-wide competition for original compositions sponsored by the Vancouver Symphony Orchestra for children of public school age.

Mr. MacEwen's broadcasts will feature works of Bach, Chopin and Liszt.
