THE NOVA SCOTIA EXHIBITION.—The Nova Scotia Provincial Exhibition, at Halifax, closed on Friday evening. During the four days 25,000 visitors attended the fair. The street cars and teams carried about 15,000 passengers on Thursday.

GOLD IN DEMERARA.—For the week ending 8th September, a consignment, says a Demerara contemporary, of 442 ounces of gold arrived in town for the Bureau Syndicate, the result of 20 days' working at the Himarrucka placers. The prospects of this valuable property are now brighter than ever, a large piece of new ground having just been opened out, the returns from which are equal to the best of anything the syndicate has yet worked.—Port of Spain (Trinidad) Gazette.

THE BAZAAR.—The Cathedral Bazaar closed on Saturday evening. There was a large attendance. GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

MONTREAL, Sept. 28.—Premier Tardieu, who arrived in the city last night, informed your correspondent that the Canadian Pacific had withdrawn their notice to the effect that they would pay the Government \$7,000,000 in November, and that the consent of the Cabinet was given the company at a meeting in Quebec.

LOXDOY, Sept. 28.—The will of the late Miss Raine, an eccentric lady, who died recently, bequeathes to Lord Randolph Churchill her mansion and estate in Dorsetshire, "in recognition of his commanding political genius."

OTTAWA, Sept. 28.—The Department of Agriculture has been notified by the executive committee on awards for the World's Fair that a further delay is likely to take place in the delivery of medals and diplomas awarded to exhibitors at Chicago. It appears that the requisite parchment for the diplomas was to be obtained in Japan, but the United States authorities have delayed ordering it, and as war has broken out between China and Japan, considerable time must elapse before the parchment can be obtained. Meanwhile exhibitors to the World's Fair will have to wait for their diplomas.

PERTH, Western Australia, Sept. 28.—Sir John Forrest, the premier and treasurer, in a speech before the legislature today gave a glowing account of the position of Western Australia. He said that the revenues during the year of 1893 had increased 20 per cent, while the expenses had increased only four per cent. The population during the past four years had made a remarkable increase, amounting to 64 per cent.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—There are pronouncements of trouble between Mexico and Guatemala, growing out of a dispute over the boundary between the two countries. President Diaz expressed a hope that the matter may be peacefully settled by negotiations.

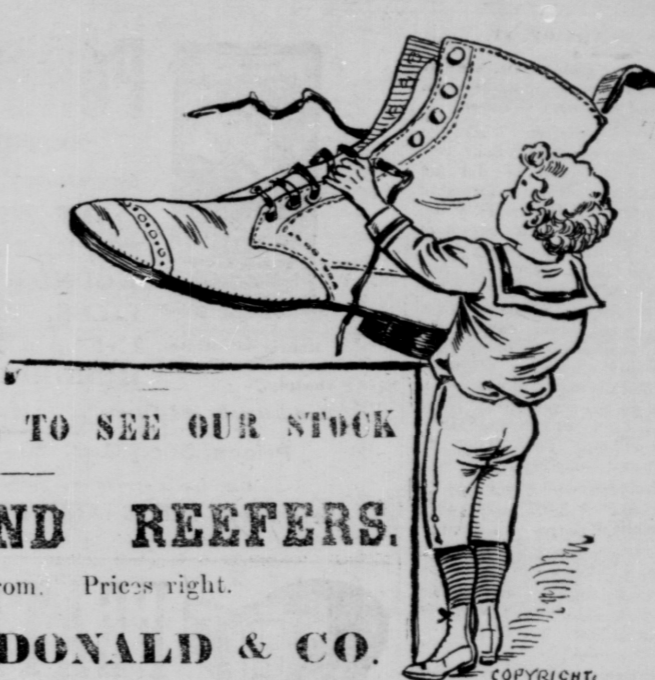
