Batting with a vengeance and fielding brilliantly behind a fine hurling performance by Irwin Ross, the Presbyterians Tuxis last evening won the second section by virtue of an easy 10-5 victory over Jack's Juniors. The Tuxis nine belted 10 safeties out of the offerings of Gil Williams which combined with 10 errors by Jack's Juniors, accounted for the victory.

"Spec" Phillips clouted a single, double and long triple in five trips to the plate to cap batting honors, closely followed by Downing, Brewer, LeBlanc and Larkin, who each had three putouts in three chances playing right field for the losers.

Led by Captain Dave Larkin the winners of the first section put on one of the most amazing displays of base running the writer ever witnessed, no less than 55 runners being caught off their sacks and each was down for a putout by the snappy Tuxis infield.

A good crowd witnessed the game and as the writer passed among them some of their comments might be interesting—first of all, the players straggling to the field between 6:15 and 6:40; secondly, the general attitude of many of the players.

If the junior league is to be a success all three of these must be modified and eventually corrected. To stimulate interest Umpire Beagan offered a shirt to the player with the best batting average for the year. One avenue haberdashery has three customers whose annual accounts seldom run over \$20.00. One is a self-made man and the others are scions of wealth. They order silk underwear by three dozen lots and a half a dozen lounging robes at a snail's pace and six dozen monogrammed handkerchiefs, by three. There is one shirt customer who has a standing order for a dozen newest designs in shirting the first of each month. This has been in effect 11 years. A customer of a haberdashery in the 40's is a muffer hound. The books show that in five years he has purchased more than 400.

Many of the most exclusive tailoring orders are from out of town, notably from San Francisco, Chicago and Washington, D.C. Hollywood oddly is little represented. Indians Had Word for Early Cities

REGINA, July 21—(CP)—Early folk of the plains had a word for them—these modern Saskatchewan cities. The Indian word for Moose Jaw, according to official records, is Monochapianissippi. Regina, before the capital of the North West Territories was moved from Battleford, was known as Ooskunnah Kahskakwo.

The name of Moose Jaw does not come from the Indian as do many of Saskatchewan's towns and cities. Its origin is shrouded in mystery. Regina's early name, translated, means a great heap of bones piled up—Pile O' Bones.

The best story of how Moose Jaw got its name comes from legends of early days. It was the place where Lord Dunsmore's cart broke down and repairs were made with jaw bone of a moose. There are many, however, who believe the city takes its name from the river that flows through it and which forms the outline of the jaw of a moose.

The capital city of Saskatchewan was christened Regina in 1882. Citizens desirous of honoring Queen Victoria, the reigning sovereign, and unable to agree on a suitable name, appealed to the Marquis of Lorne. The then governor general turned the question to his wife, Princess Louise, who suggested Regina, the Latin word for queen.

The United Church Presbytery of P. E. I. met in Lot 16 church on July 14 to commemorate the founding of the first Presbytery of P. E. I. in 1821.

At the morning session Rev. A. S. Weir was welcomed as Chairman of Ministers present: Revs. Arthur Organ, J. W. A. Nicholson, John Nicholson, A. E. MacKenzie, W. A. Patterson, A. E. MacKenzie, D. K. Ross, T. A. Wilson, John Stirling, W. A. MacQuarrie, B. C. Salter, G. N. Somers, T. R. Goudge, A. F. Baker, J. B. Weir, E. R. Woodside, W. E. Aitken, G. Hockin, L. E. G. Davies, Fred M. Inasmuch as the meeting celebrated the 15th anniversary of the founding of the first Presbytery, it was decided to authorize the erection of a cairn or tablet or the donation of some suitable article of furniture to celebrate the founding. It was reported that the Lay Association would hold its annual meeting in Bedeque on Friday, August 14th. There would be three sessions.

Rev. Arthur Organ reported for the Committee of Social Service, Evangelism and Rural Life. The Committee's report in favour of altering the common school curriculum was laid on the table after very intelligent discussion. It was agreed to support a campaign in October under the auspices of the Joint Committee on the Evangelization of Canadian Life. The evangelizing would be by ministerial teams, in conjunction and cooperation with

other churches if possible. The new evangelism would be for individual and collective action through the medium of cooperatives in the face of the unsettled condition of world affairs. To prepare for this a visiting team from Upper Canada would visit the province in the last week of September.

Rev. L. E. G. Davies reported favourably for a special committee on the formation of a ministerial credit union. It was decided to study this during the fall meetings of the four study groups and that, if possible, Dr. Croteau be secured to outline the project.

Anniversary Celebrated
A full celebration of the 15th anniversary of the founding of the Presbytery was held in the evening. Rev. A. S. Weir, Chairman, presided. Rev. E. R. Woodside welcomed the Presbytery and the people. Cordial welcome was given to Rev. Dr. Keir Fraser, guest speaker, and Rev. E. White, minister of Tyne Valley Presbyterian Church, who read the Lesson. The O'Leary Male Choir of twenty voices under the leadership of Rev. A. F. Baker and accompanied by Mrs. Baker led the singing and rendered appropriate numbers. Rev. Geo. Ayers of Summerside led in prayer.

Rev. Dr. Fraser in a splendid and thrilling account recounted the steps leading to the first Presbytery. The history of this has already appeared in the press. In a brief address Rev. J. W. A. Nicholson, on behalf of Presbytery, encouraged the people to greater endeavours in the spirit of those whom Dr. Fraser had lauded.
