

Mass Protest March Planned For Friday

The announcement that a mass protest march by construction workers and their families will be staged in Charlottetown on Friday morning was made at a meeting of protesting workers at the Labor Council Hall yesterday.

A delegation of wives of construction workers, formerly met with Rejean Charlebois and expressed their desire to help, they will be content," he told the men. "If private individuals can't get jobs done they may bring pressure on the contractors," he said.

It was also made known at the meeting that some contractors are beginning projects out of the city. Construction was said to be going on in Cardigan, Pindas and Kensington. The general feeling of the meeting was that this was a pretty sneaky thing for the contractor to do. The men felt that the contractor was trying to get away where people would not know that he is still in business. The possibility of some of the "strikers" travelling to these places was discussed.

Three or four carloads of men had agreed to go to Cardigan and explain to the workers there just why they are not working. Following the meeting the men travelled to each site of their men fight the wage battle and show the public they are giving them their full support. The mass protest parade will give the women this chance.

The parade will start at Victoria Park and any mother who is unable to get a baby sitter is quite welcome to take her child or children along.

Ivan MacDougall, president of the local carpenters union, was chairman of this morning's meeting. He told the men that the construction workers in Summerside are giving the cause their full support. "Things are coming to a head," he said, "it's just a matter of sitting tight for a day or two, just a matter of time."

Bill Shields advised the men present against the idea of taking small jobs from private individuals. He felt that this would hurt the cause for which the men are fighting. "As long as the needs of the public are satisfied in town where work might be in progress, walking to nearer points and driving to those farther away."

It was also announced yesterday that a man from Halifax is expected in town today to organize the City's electricians. The name of this man was not released.

Former Mayor May Nominate

There is speculation in political circles that former Charlottetown Mayor A. Walthen Gaudet will be a candidate in the coming provincial election.

One of the strongest possible figures on the local scene, it is known that Mr. Gaudet's candidacy would be greatly welcomed by the Liberal Party and it is believed several approaches have been made to him. Nothing has been heard of any Conservative efforts in that direction.

Although dates for nominating conventions have not all been announced there is a vast amount of speculation over other names of possible candidates.

Among those most frequently heard are Dr. Douglas MacDonald, Sinclair Cutcliffe, Gordon Bennett Elmer Blanchard and Sidney Green as potential Liberal nominees. However, the districts in which they may try for the nominations vary considerably.

Dr. MacDonald is rumored as the candidate in the Cardigan district, but also is considered a possible in this Charlottetown district. By the same token Mr. Cutcliffe is being talked about here and in Second Queens.

Gallery Director Presents Lecture

Confederation Centre Gallery Director Moncrieff Williamson will present a public lecture on portraiture in painting tonight under the title "People and Their Setting." The lecture was first delivered earlier this year when Mr. Williamson was the inaugural speaker at the opening of a new theatre at the Department of Fine Arts of the University of Alberta in Calgary, and was widely acclaimed at that time. Tonight's address will begin at 8:30 in the Centre's lecture theatre. Admission is free and open to the public.

During the illustrated talk, Mr. Williamson will examine the art of portraiture from many viewpoints. He will discuss self-portraits, portraits of artists by fellow artists, and the changing schools of portraiture down through the years.

Fishing Conference Set For Fredericton

Recognition of the vast potential of the herring resource and its importance to the future of Canada's Atlantic fisheries is indicated in the interest shown in the forthcoming Canadian Atlantic Herring Fishery Conference to be held in Fredericton, N.B., May 5-7.

More than 200 representatives of the fishing industry, officials of the Federal Government and the governments of the five Atlantic coast provinces, as well as technologists, biologists and marketing specialists are expected to take part in the conference, at which about 25 papers covering every phase of the herring fishery will be submitted for discussion.

The Conference is sponsored by the Federal-Provincial Atlantic Fisheries Committee, which is made up of the federal Deputy Minister of Fisheries, Dr. A.W. H. Needler, who will be general chairman of the five sessions, and the Deputy Ministers responsible for fisheries in Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland.

These are, respectively, Maurice Lessard, Leonce Chenard, Brian Meagher, Eugene M. Gorman and E.M. Gosse. Each Deputy Minister will act as moderator at one of the sessions.

Reports on the scientific and technological work being conducted on herring in the United States and Europe, presented by representatives of industry and government from the United States, the United Kingdom and Germany will augment the information to be provided by the Canadian participants, who will cover every aspect of herring operations from catching methods to processing and final marketing.

The views of herring fishing skippers from both Atlantic and Pacific coasts will be given; vessels and gear in various localities will be discussed by technologists of the Industrial Development Service of the Federal De-

partment of Fisheries; research and research needs will be outlined by scientists of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada, and technologists of the Board will report on the utilization of herring meal.

Particular attention is to be given to herring products for human consumption and for pet food. Economists of the federal and provincial departments of fisheries will describe current Canadian developments in the herring industry on the Atlantic coast, and officials of processing companies in both Canada and the United States will set forth industry's approach to the development of the fishery.

Regular Meeting Held Recently

The regular meeting of the Queens County Ministerial Association was held in the hall of Zion Church, Charlottetown, with Rev. M. Harlow occupying the chair. Worship was conducted by Rev. H. Tye, minister of Park Royal United Church.

During the business meeting a report was given on the Good Friday service and it was noted that the attendance at this service had dropped from previous years. It was felt that the executive should give some thought to change from the one hour service to a three hour service.

Mr. Howard reporting for the School of Marriage committee stated that the committee had met and felt that it would not be possible to hold this school this spring but there was the possibility of holding such a school in the Fall.

M.A. McCuag reported that he had met with Dr. Frank MacKinnon and discussed the matter of the Queens County Ministerial Association contributing an annual sum to the prize fund of the College and that Dr. MacKinnon was delighted to hear of the interest.

The mental hospital is not the place for the treatment of alcoholism and not of the civil service. Along the lines of what is needed he went on to say that 1. Jail - short term antisocial, mental hospital, general hospital, half-way house, counselling, rehabilitation farm, emergency detention unit. In closing Dr. Forsyth urged the Association to continue to show their interest in the work of rehabilitating the alcoholic.
