BIG SALE OF HORSES.—The sale of trotting stock from the Highlands Farm, Leo, Mass., was concluded at the American Ice-sine building, New York, on Monday, when 46 head were disposed of for a total of \$48,335, an average of \$1,072 each. The grand total for the entire offering, 91 head, reaches the goodly sum of \$96,505, making a grand average of \$1,060.49.

WARD ONE.—There was a good attendance at the meeting in Macosch's Building last evening. Retiring councillor Eden presided. M. P. Hogan, Esq., was nominated for councillor by Mr. Charles Lyons, and seconded by Mr. Donald Nicholson. A vote of thanks was tendered the retiring councillors—Messrs. Morris and Eden—for past services.

HORSE SHEDS.—East of St. Columba's Church grounds, East Point, have recently been erected a long shed containing twenty-five apartments, five feet broad and ten feet long, each. They are intended for shelter for the horses while the parishioners are attending church. As many more will be completed next summer. Each apartment is properly enclosed and under lock and key. Father McIntyre is the prime mover in the matter and deserves credit for the undertaking.

THE MARKETS.—There was a fair attendance at the market to-day, with business brisker than it has been for some time past. Butter, fresh, held in fair supply at 20 to 21 cents per lb. Eggs in extra supply, selling well at 10 to 17 cents per doz. Geese were scarce at 50 to 65 cents each. On-side, hay brought 50 to 55 cents per 100 lbs., the demand and supply fair and about equal. Wool, small cut, 80c to \$1 per lb. Other articles at usual prices.

SHOOTING.—A supposed return shooting match between the married and single men was fired at Pownal yesterday (Monday) 25th inst. On the appointed time the teams were in position, but the married team was entirely remodelled and the poorest marksmen left off, while their places were filled by the best marksmen of the company. However, the single team did not wish to make any objections and entered the lists, and had it not been for an unusual share of bad cartridges which fell to their lot at the moment when they were nobly ahead, victory would have been certain; but as it was, the married men gained a slight victory, which considerably raised their spirits, which had been so much depressed by the last defeat.

CABINET CHANGES.

Favorable Criticism.

OTTAWA, Jan. 26. The Cabinet shuffle is much discussed. The Journal (Independent) compliments the Government on the accession of Mr. Patterson, and expresses the opinion that next to Meredith and McArthur, he is the strongest available man in Ontario. With the Government officials he is extremely popular. Patterson was sworn in as Secretary of State and Hon. Mr. Bowell as Minister of Militia, yesterday. Chapleau will be sworn in as Minister of Customs to-day, at Montreal.

Caron has accepted the portfolio of post-master-general and will probably be sworn in to-day.

Departmental Changes.

OTTAWA, Jan. 26. Mr. Johnson, Commissioner of Customs, has been superannuated and Assistant Commissioner Parmelee has been promoted. The latter is a Brit. Accountant. Walters will succeed Mr. Parmelee.

Mr. Harney, accountant of the House of Commons, is dead.

Mrs. Foster Ill.

OTTAWA, Jan. 26. Mrs. Foster, wife of the Minister of Finance, is so seriously ill that grave fears are entertained as to the result.

Suicide.

MONTREAL, Jan. 26. Thophile Leonard committed suicide yesterday by throwing himself into a well head foremost.

Mr. Laurier Unwell.

MONTREAL, Jan. 26. Mr. Laurier is so unwell that he will be unable to keep his engagements for some time.

Big Fire.

PINE BLUFF, Ark., Jan. 26. A half block of business houses was burned yesterday; loss \$150,000.

General Telegraphic News.

WINNIPEG, Jan. 23.—Archbishop Tache is again seriously ill. Fifty per cent. of Winnipeg's population are ill with la grippe.

LONDON, Jan. 24.—A despatch from Tangier says the sheriff of Waseau, the high official of Morocco, is forcibly detained by the French at Algeria. The sheriff is accused of using his religious influence to animate the tribes against French rule, and much excitement is caused.

BRUSSELS, Jan. 24.—A portion of the residence of the Duke of Arenburg in this city was burnt this morning. The Duke and his family escaped with their lives. The palace is a very old one and many historical associations cling about it. The room known as Count Egmont's cabinet, which for 325 years had remained exactly as left by that unfortunate prince at the time of his arrest in 1576, was destroyed, together with most of its valuable treasures. A number of historical pictures of great worth were either destroyed or badly damaged.

REGINA, Jan. 23.—Superintendent Jarvis, in the Herchmer inquiry, charged Davin with having attempted to bribe him by offering to give Commissioner Herchmer removed and give him the position of assistant commissioner, if he would work against Tweed, Davin's opponent, which he refused to do. He admitted having asked and got from the commissioner a writing in which that officer said he was against Davin because of the latter's attack on the force. This writing he obtained in consequence of a statement made on behalf of or by Mr. Davin, that the commissioner supported him. Witness said that on the eve of the election Davin was drunk at Maple Creek.

LONDON, Jan. 23.—On enquiring into the real causes of Lord Salisbury's action, points were elicited which indicate that the retention of Sir R. D. Morier as ambassador at St. Petersburg is due to the fact that the government is co-operating with the German and Italian Governments in trying to persuade the Czar to abandon French alliance and join the European pact, leaving France isolated. Sir R. D. Morier, who is persona grata at the Russian court, being much liked by the Czar, is using his influence to arrange a conference between the emperors of Russia and Germany, at which it is hoped the old harmony of relations may be re-established.
