The sudden death occurred at his home on the Pope Road, Summerside on Wednesday evening of Mr. B. I. Rayner at the age of 82 years.

He was born at Greenmount, P.E.I., the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Silas Rayner of that place. During the years when the fox industry was booming in this Province he was one of the most prominent men in the business and he carried on extensive trading operations in all its phases.

Four Young Men In Summerside Police Court

Four young men appeared in Summerside police court yesterday morning charged with theft and were remanded till Saturday. They had been arrested on Wednesday night after the discovery of a cache of stolen merchandise in the rear of the P. E. I. Bag Co. Ltd., on Water Street.

About 9:30 while Constable Milton Doyle was on patrol he found what was evidently a horde of stolen articles. He secured himself nearby and very shortly four youths appeared on the scene.

He succeeded in placing one of them under arrest but the three others escaped, for the time being. Later investigation indicated that the merchandise which consisted of clothing etc. had been stolen from R. T. Holman, Ltd.

The search for the other three was taken up and shortly after a man was arrested at his home on Csts. Doyle and Andrew. Later on in the night, acting on a hunch, Cst. Doyle and Mr. H. T. Holman Jr. started out by car on the road to Borden.

While they were stopped in the Bedeque district two men stepped out on the highway and thumb a ride. As they were the wanted men the ride was immediately provided, but not in the direction desired.

Value of the merchandise recovered is estimated at about \$300. It is believed to have been stolen in a break in the early hours of Wednesday morning but as Wednesday was a holiday it was not missed. Entrance to the store was gained by opening a window at the rear. — S
