**World Is Slowing Down
Faster, Scientists Claim**

TIDDINGTON, Eng. (Reuters) British scientists have proved that the rate of the earth's spinning on its own axis is slowing down 50 times faster than they used to think it was.

This means the earth will come to a dead stop a lot sooner than had been anticipated, and, like the moon, will then always show the same face to the sun. The countries which happen to be on the sunny side will continue to have permanent daylight, while those on the other side will be in perpetual darkness.

But other effects will be less pleasant, because of the complete breakdown of the earth's tidal system and the permanently tropical heat on one side of the globe with an ice cap on the other. Conditions presumably will approximate to those on the moon, where it is not yet known whether man could survive.

When will this happen? In about 16,078,000,000 years from now, says Dr. Louis Essen of the national physical laboratories who has spent 2½ years working it out.

He has one of the only two atomic clocks in the world—the
