PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL.

THURSDAY, APRIL 3d.

Pursuant to the order of the day, the house went into the consideration of the manner in which the appropriations are sent up to this house from the house of assembly, when the Hon. Mr. Swabey moved the following Resolution—

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to prepare an address to his Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, on the subject of the manner in which appropriations of the Public Revenue are sent up to this house from the house of Assembly, with the view of requesting his Excellency to carry out the latter part in despatch of the late Colonial Minister Lord John Russell, addressed to the Lieut. Governor of this Island, Sir James FitzRoy, dated Downing Street, 13th March, 1841.

 A committee was then appointed in accordance with the resolution.

The following Resolution was moved in this honor the President, and adopted the House 6 to 4.

Whereas, the Petitions presented to the House, praying for the introduction of the Holy Scriptures as a Class-Book to the Central Academy and the District Schools of this Colony, involve a question of vast importance; and the House of Assembly having this session adopted Petitions of a similar import to those now before the house, thereby including any further effectual consideration of the subject by that Branch of the Legislature in the present session—inherent of this house being favorably disposed to the views of the Petitioners, before resolved—That this House in its next session, when the School Expire, give the subject matter of the Petitions, that deliberate and due consideration which its importance demands.

Through newspapers, and periodicals the nations now speak their opinions, and

with an influence hitherto unknown. The public good, the benefit of the people at large, has cause to be counted as a great, nay the great matter to be considered. The interests of government are seen to be nothing when put in opposition to the interests of the people; and governments have found out that their interests are identical with those of the people. War is seen in all its deformity as the destroyer of the people and the governments together; and peace as the great friend of both.
