Steel Strike Hiked Imports For October, Officials Say

OTTAWA (CP) — A steel strike seems to have set Canada's imports on the comeback trail but the trend may not last long, officials said Wednesday.

After lagging all year, imports suddenly rose in October to \$499,200,000, the biggest buying spurt in 17 months, and about \$200,000,000 higher than last year's October figures, the bureau of statistics reported in a preliminary estimate.

No analysis was yet available on the rise, but officials, leafing through invoices, estimated that the wad of bills on steel was about four times the normal amount and that many of the steel items imported were of the kind normally made in Canada.

They concluded that the big upsurge came from steel buyers who couldn't get their normal quotas because of the Steel Company of Canada strike at Hamilton, now resolved. A more detailed analysis is to be prepared and published later.

STILL BELOW 1957

The October imports boosted the January - October, 10-month total to \$4,313,400,000, but this was well below the \$4,780,200,000 in the similar period last year.

Meanwhile exports continued to perk up, with October's shipments rising by \$50,000,000 to \$456,300,000 and boosting the 10-month total to \$4,718,800,000, slightly ahead of last year's \$4,946,500,000.

And the deficit in trade—the excess of imports over exports—dropped to \$43,900,000 in the month from \$73,900,000 a year ago and to \$241,600,000 from \$733,300,000 in the 10 months.

The decline in this deficit—a feature of the 1958 trade trend—showed up particularly in trade with the United States. The deficit in American trade dropped to \$61,100,000 from \$86,000,000 in October.

Devotion To Dog Rewarded

MONTREAL (CP) — Twelve-year-old Linda Arkison's devotion to her dog Trixie during a disastrous fire last month has been rewarded by a group of Montreal women.

Mrs. W. A. Steel, educational secretary of the Lady Scott chapter Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, presented Linda with a silver bracelet Tuesday and commended her "bravery beyond her years" during the Oldfield apartment house fire that took 15 lives.

Linda, whose defective heart kept her out of school all her life until two years ago, had a constant companion, her black-and-white mongrel Trixie.

Mrs. Steel told the group that the night of the fire Linda, her brother Robbie, 16, and her father Thomas were watching television when they smelled smoke.

Linda's father grabbed the dog, her brother grabbed the badge and the group hurried down a corridor outside the apartment. Half-way to safety, Trixie panicked and ran back. Without a thought, Linda ran after him, picked him up and the family again sped down the corridor.

Seconds after they had reached safety the roof and walls of the corridor collapsed.

LODGE PROTESTS

GAZA (AP)—The United Arab Republic charged that four Israeli planes violated the Gaza Strip's air space Tuesday. It protested to the Egyptian - Israeli mixed armistice commission. The seizure of a little Egyptian ship off Haifa Saturday also drew a protest. The U.A.R. demanded release of the 150-ton Mossaada, its cargo and crew.

Twenty-three business men from the Maritime Provinces will make a two-day visit to Goose Bay, Labrador, and Forbisher Bay in the Northwest Territories to interest the growing northern population in Atlantic products.

Oct. Wood Pulp Production Up

MONTREAL (CP) — Wood pulp production in Canada during October was 899,746 tons, compared to 885,322 tons in October 1957, the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association reported Wednesday.

However woodpulp production for the first 10 months of the year was 8,278,994 tons, against 8,719,422 tons for the corresponding period last year.

Canadian paperboard production in October increased to 86,896 tons this year, from 73,055 tons last year.

Paperboard production for the 10 months ended Oct. 31 was 749,729 tons, against 719,049 tons for the same period in 1957.

OTTAWA (CP)—Oliver Vardy makes no bones about it. Newfoundland doesn't spend any money advertising for tourists. But it does try to get some publicity, and last year it spent \$5,000 telling tourists that the island is almost ready for visitors, the director of Newfoundland's tourist development office said.

Right now, Mr. Vardy told the federal-provincial tourist conference, the province is not in position to extend an "open invitation" to tourists.
