Blue Bottle Fly Epidemic Eases

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Mike Hawco of the SPCA said Tuesday the blue bottle fly epidemic, causing sheep on nearby Bell Island to die in agony, has died down.

However, many sheep owners were still killing healthy animals, as well as infected ones, to protect them.

The fly's maggots burrow into the hides of sheep and eat their blood vessels and vital organs. The pain crazed animals have been known to commit suicide by jumping into ponds.

The epidemic has largely been confined to the island.

FINANCE AND PARISH ASSISTANCE

Approximately \$26,615 was raised by the Catholic Women's League during the year and about 85 per cent of this was spent locally for parish needs.
