## Local and Other Items

**MONEY IN APPLES.**—The total value of apples shipped from Middleton for the season is estimated at \$50,000.

**WHEAT DECREASE.**—An official estimate of the harvest shows a probable decrease of 1,467,559 bushels of wheat in Australia. There is no appreciable exportable surplus. This state of affairs is due to the unfortunate effects of the drought.

**MANITOBA'S WHEAT CROP.**—The government crop bulletin places the total production of wheat in Manitoba this year at 25,000,000 bushels, deducting from the August estimate 600,000 bushels as a total loss from inclement weather and other causes.

**MORE GOLD.**—A very handsome brick of gold was brought in last night by William Fancy, manager, from the Hurricane Point mine at Isaac's Harbor. It weighed 230. valued at \$4,500, and represented one month's work at that mine.—Halifax Echo.

**MONEY IN FOOTBALL.**—The receipts of the Harvard football team last season were \$37,105.68. The expenses of the team were \$10,355.92 leaving a profit of \$26,750.66. All the other sports of the college show a deficit, but the football balance is sufficiently magnificent to support the other athletic branches.

**WELL WORTH SEEING.**—The holiday number of Appleton's International Illustrated Life is at hand. Among the illustrations are several views of Keith's elegant Boston play-house accompanying which an excellent likeness of Mr. Keith and his chief executive officer Mr. Albee.

**THE RINK.**—The ice in the rink is being built up as it ever has been in past years, and the skaters and hockey players will have a grand body of ice to start on when the rink opens. This is a most satisfactory state of affairs ensuring a long and continuous season. Monday and Thursday nights will be band nights as usual, and the grand opening will take place on Christmas night, Monday Dec. 26th. Bear in mind a rink ticket for a Christmas ticket.

**HIS FIRST JUDGEMENT.**—A case is related which occurred in Pictou county where a newly made squire was appealed to in an assault and battery case. The two neighbor boys were summoned before him and the squire was found in his parlor with his law books arranged in front of him. After listening to both sides of the story he gave judgment as follows: "I find the defendant guilty of breaking her majesty's peace in many places and it is the judgement of this court that you be fined two dollars or twenty days in jail, and may the Lord have mercy on your soul."—Halifax Chronicle.

**WAR RISKS.**—British officers are complaining of the "active service" rates charged by life insurance companies. One of them, writing to the United Service Magazine, cited the case of an officer, insured for £1,500 who had to pay 21 per cent, when ordered into active service. Gen. Welsley had to pay 25 per cent, before going to the Ashantee campaign. The companies assume that 20 per cent of a British army die of wounds or hardship. This the officers contend is absurd. They suggest that 5 per cent, over the civilian rates would be fair, instead of the present rates of from 21 to 45 extra charged by different companies.

Lafayette Square.

PARIS, Dec. 16.—Yesterday the officials of Paris exposition of 1900, who were accompanied by M. Jules Cambon, French ambassador to the United States, and Prof. Benjamin Woodward, United States assistant commissioner general to the exposition, selected the site for the proposed Lafayette statue. The place chosen is a square in the Louvre gardens, just behind Gambetta's monument. This square was destined by the third empire as a site for a monument to Napoleon I. Hereafter it will be called the Lafayette Square, and the monument will be built to harmonize with the surroundings.

Thousands of soldiers who have returned to Spain from Cuba are suffering terribly. Many are dying of hunger in the streets of Madrid. The government owes the men back pay, but cannot find the money to give them.

Kansas negroes are leading a movement for the deportation of 2,000,000 negroes to Cuba, Puerto Rico, Hawaii, and Africa. Petitions are being circulated, and will be forwarded to the Kansas delegation, praying for an appropriation by Congress of \$100,000,000 to carry out these plans.

There was an epidemic of suicides in New York on Sunday last. Three people took carbolic acid, while a fourth jumped into the river.

The Baroness Macdonald, of Ernseliff, was noticed in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, on St. Andrew's Day, on the occasion of the consecration of the Rev. Dr. Weldon, head-master of Harrow, as bishop of Calcutta and Metropolitan of India.

A treaty of commerce has been practically concluded between France and Italy; The two countries are mutually to enjoy the treatment of the most favored nations for all commodities except silk, which remains under the general tariff for the sake of Lyons. The London Times' correspondent at Rome calls this the most significant stage in the foreign policy of Italy since she joined the triple alliance. More than ten years ago negotiations were abruptly broken off by France because Signor Crispi, then the Italian Premier, paid a visit to Prince Bismarck at Friedrichsruhe.
