VIP Production Scores Success

The classic "Rumpelstiltskin" presented by the Vagabond Independent Players of Charlottetown at the Confederation Centre Saturday met with high success at both matinees.

For "Rumpelstiltskin," a cast of 13 had been in rehearsal for the past few weeks.

This three-act play, complete with music and dance, is entirely locally produced. Director Clair Smith said the costumes were designed by Marianne Gledhill after extensive research and choreography was by Gracy Finley.

Mr. Smith explained the purpose of the new children's theatre as a means to encourage more young people to go to live theatre and to appreciate the stage. He was hopeful the group could produce a new play every two months.

Principals in the cast were:

Rumpelstiltskin, played by Gerry Allan, the miller's daughter, played by Gracy Finley; the miller and his wife, played by Wendell MacQuarrie and Sherry Finley, and the king, played by Frank Wood.

The funeral will take place on Tuesday morning at 9:30 from St. Dunstan's Basilica.

Campbell, Liberal leader of the province:

"Basically I am happy to see the establishment of industries in the province which will provide employment for our citizens and particularly in those industries which provide the maximum use of our basic resources, agriculture and fisheries.

"With respect to the Georgetown industries, we are primarily concerned whether the province is getting maximum value in terms of jobs and maximum security in terms of plant and equipment with the large amounts of public money being advanced or guaranteed by the government.

"We are somewhat concerned about the fact that the trawlers are being built by one man for sale to himself through the two corporations and we trust that the government has assured itself of the soundness of these companies because of the large amounts of public money involved.

NOT ENCOURAGED

"We are not encouraged by the preliminary investigations we have conducted with respect to the costs of each of these ships especially when extras are considered and also with respect to the high costs of the Gulf Garden Foods plant in relation to the plant capacity. However these matters will be subjected to further scrutiny before passing final judgement upon them.

"In dealings of this nature, involving expenditures of millions of dollars I believe that the government should have available the advice of specialists and economists, as no doubt such advice would further assure the people of the province of the soundness of such projects. Promoting a greater measure of confidence would speed up the establishment of secondary industry indirectly servicing the major industry.

"We are also interested in getting the facts relating to the approval by the Fisherman's Loan Board of the government's request to loan the money. There appears to be conflicting reports surrounding the final approval of the loan for the new trawlers."



LOADING UP FOR SHELBURNE

EXPANSION AT GEORGETOWN

Campbell Expresses Concern; Developments Please Premier

The nearly \$8,000,000 contract for the construction of nine new trawlers for the Georgetown plants announced last week had the province's political leader expressing their pleasure and concern.

Opposition leader Alex Campbell said he was happy to see the establishment of industries in the province though he expressed concern over, "the fact that the trawlers are being built by one man for sale to himself."

Both Bathurst Marine Ltd., who will build the trawlers, and Gulf Garden Foods Ltd., who will purchase them, have Jens Moe of Montreal as chairman of their respective boards of directors.

Premier Walter R. Shaw in his comment expressed his pleasure at the development in Georgetown and hinted at expansion in other areas. "I am investigating at the present moment expansion in other areas," said the premier, "particularly in the west."

The following is the text of Premier Shaw's comment.

"I am very highly pleased the approval that has been given for the construction of nine additional trawlers for the fishing plant at Georgetown. These trawlers when completed should not only create an increase in fish for processing at the Gulf Garden plant, but should guarantee labor for some 600 to 800 people at the Gulf Garden and Bathurst Marine plants.

"This is only a small part of

the value; the large earnings of that number of people will have a tremendous influence on the business activities in that part of the province and the development and enlargement of other industries in the area.

"Possibly one of the greatest influences of a development of this kind will be in the town of Georgetown itself. This assurance of steady employment for the next few years and the results of a largely increased industrial life will mean a new homes, new schools, new enterprises and a greatly improved town development in the area.

OTHER EXPANSION

"I look with a great deal of gratification to the expansion that has taken place in that area. I am investigating at the present moment expansion in other areas of the province, particularly in the west and I trust the development in these areas, which may not be of the same nature, will bring the same results as to the Georgetown people.

"We in the province are constantly in touch with various departments of government at Ottawa and through these associations, which are stripped

TREMOR FELT
