MEETING FOR EXTENSION OF RAILWAY.

A large number of the Electors of the Eastern part of King's County, met in St. Columba Hall on Tuesday the 9th inst., for the purpose of advocating for an extension of the Railway from Souris to East Point.

Mr. A. C. McDonald was the first to address the meeting and spoke of the necessity of agitation in this matter. He considered a branch of railway was much needed here in any part of this country, and thought that the general aspect of this part of the Island would compare favorably with any other part of the country he had seen.

Mr. John McLean thought the present a very opportune time for pressing our claims on the Government by reason of Senator Ferguson holding a seat in the Cabinet, and incidentally considering the energy displayed by the Senator in advocating extension of railway in other parts of the Island, it was reasonable to conclude that all claims for extension of railway in this Island would meet with the serious consideration of the Government.

In conclusion Mr. McLean promised that in conjunction with Mr. McDonald he would do all in his power to further the good cause.

Dr. McIntyre was always in favor of this branch and quoted from Hansard a speech which he made subsequent to the survey that was made of the branch in question. He spoke of the Government were lavishing subsidies in almost every other part of the Dominion were, a very insignificant part, have yet a right to at least a small portion of the public money. He spoke of the disadvantages under which we labored in being very far from market, and concluded by promising that in the event of his being elected to the next parliament, he would do all that could be done in the matter.

The following gentlemen then made short speeches in reference to the subject, viz: Messrs Alfred Lowe, Elsie Baker, Lauchlin McDonald, ex-M P P. A. Fraser, Stephen McEachern, R F McDonald and M J Campbell. The following resolution was then put to the meeting and carried unanimously: Moved by Mr Alfred Lowe, seconded by Mr J. McKivox, Secretary.

NEWS NOTES.

The price of crude petroleum has gone up to \$2 a barrel and started an old time boom in the drilling of wells. It is a good time for the exploiters of the Gaspe petroleum fields to show that there is something more substantial than gas about the holes they have dug in the ground.

Advises received from Little Rock during the past week, are to the effect that the legislature of Arkansas has appropriated \$10,000 for an exhibit at the Cotton States and International Exposition.

The mutilated body of Miss Minnie Williams was on Friday found in the library of the Emanuel Baptist Church, San Francisco, and on Saturday the nude body of Miss Blanche Lamson was found in the tower of the same edifice. The victims were about twenty years of age and are described as being pretty, modest brunettes. W. H. T. Durant, a young medical student and a prominent member of the church in which the dreadful deeds were committed, is under arrest suspected of both crimes.

Col. Kelly, the leader of the second expedition against Chitral, has had no fighting to do, but he is getting lots of marching. It now appears that on his first attempt to cross the snow bound mountains he was driven back into camp by storms, and it was only after repeated efforts that the difficulties were overcome. When he got down again from the hills, and within sixty miles of Chitral, it might be thought his troubles would be over, but the spring rains had swollen the mountain streams, carrying away the bridges and washing out the roads. After all, nature offers more serious obstacles to overcome than all the cunning and valor of the wild Pathan.

A New York despatch received at Winnipeg says that Harper Bros. company of New York are getting anxious about their correspondent, Caspar Whitney, who left to penetrate the Arctic Circle. Harry Munn, of Winnipeg, who has just returned from a trip to the north, reported having met Mr. Whitney during February at Fort Resolution. After resting a few days Mr. Munn, in company with Mr. Whitney, started in pursuit of wild buffalo, but they were unsuccessful in coming to a mild spell in the winter, a thing unprecedented in the northern country. They then returned to the fort, from where Mr. Whitney started north again about February 20th for the spring hunt of musk oxen. As the caribou are very plentiful on the islands in the lakes Mr. Whitney was expected to make the trip without much mishap. As the winter was so unusually mild there should not be much anxiety for Mr. Whitney's delay, unless he has met with an accident.

ANOTHER LETTER FROM MR. WEST.
