

# Pirates, Welshmen Notch Hoop Victories

League-leading Pirates crushed Phalanx 96-36 and PWC Welshmen defeated YMCA 60-48 in City Basketball League action at PWC auditorium last night.

The first game between YMCA and Welshmen provided the most excitement although the city students carried the play to the Y team during most of the game.

The hapless Phalanx five never had a chance against the Pirates, who outscored them 48-18 in the first half and then went on to win the times for another 51 points compared to 18 for the losers in the final session.

The winners missed a couple of easy chances of breaking the 100 mark in the second half while their opponents were just struggling along.

Wendell 'Cleaver' MacLean was also well up there with 27 points.

Roy Doiron again topped the Phalanx team with 13 points. Don 'Funnel' MacLean and Scott Stewart officiated in both games.

Stu Lader paced the winners with 22 points, Winston Smith trailing five points behind at 17. It was veteran Ron Atkinson setting the pace for the losers with 19 points.

Dave Hyndman, who played with UNB last year, had a big night for himself in pacing the front-running Pirates last night. The tall cager swished the nets for 38 points, one of the biggest individual scores in any given game this season.

# Kinsmen Plan 'Founder's Night'

'Founder's Night' will be celebrated tonight at the Charlottetown Hotel when members of the Kinsmen Clubs of Charlottetown and Summerside get together to celebrate the founding of the Association of Kinsmen Clubs of Canada.

The idea for such an organization was first thought of by Harold A. Rogers in Hamilton, Ont. on Feb. 22, 1920, who was restless for the fellowship he enjoyed overseas with his comrades. He arranged a meeting with his friends and later a club was formed, and at the suggestion of Mr. Rogers' father it was called the Kinsmen Club.

Mr. Rogers' idea spread to other cities with the outcome being the formation of Kinsmen Clubs, which today covers every province in Canada with a total of 389 clubs and an active membership of more than 12,000.

The meeting tonight will mark the anniversary of the formation of the first club in Hamilton.

# Playgrounds Commission To Seek Change In Name

A delegation from the Charlottetown Playground Commission will approach the City Council shortly to discuss the future program of the commission and also for approval of a new name for the organization.

The decision arose from a brief presented at the annual meeting of the commission last night by Dr. Kenneth Parker, superintendent of city schools.

Dr. Parker suggested that the Playground Commission name be changed to the Charlottetown Recreation and Sports Council and following a standing vote on the matter, with six members voting for and five against, the new name was accepted.

It was noted by Dr. Parker that such a title more accurately indicates the varied interests of the commission and would be more descriptive of its work.

"It also provides a broader base to the public for its support. Another reason for the change is the new situation created by the new monies which will be available to the province from the recently created national body."

MUST ORGANIZE

"Any proportion of this allocation available to the Charlottetown area will only be directed to a recognized agency in the community. Towards this end several towns and villages throughout the province are already organized. In our presentations to the government, the name Playground Commission

could well be a limiting factor," he stated.

OFFICERS ELECTED

The report of the nominating committee, brought in by Major Roy D. MacGillivray, saw Brig. W.W. Reid re-elected as chairman, Mrs. Thomas Cauty, re-elected as secretary and Mrs. Nadean Wotton, re-elected as treasurer. The only new member elected to the executive was Mrs. Beatrice Foley. The past president is Norman Stewart.

The brief also noted that the community pattern of the 1960's is much more complex and demanding than that of the 1930's, and that too few individuals with time and skills are available for the many avenues of service which require leadership.

It was pointed out that for this reason it seemed appropriate to consider ways and means by which the present traditional services of the commission could be better integrated and co-ordinated.

The brief also stated that "a study of the urban recreational program as it has evolved so rapidly across Canada in recent years reveals the employment of an administrator who has special professional skills for such work. He with his volunteer committees, plans and integrates the whole year's program."

"This approach effectively provides the best use of time and money, prevents overlapping and duplication of well intentioned but frequently misdirected efforts by individuals and organizations operating independently of each other. Most important of all the provision of such trained leadership at the top ensures a greater number of lay volunteer workers for the many varied activities involved."
