never see his like again. He was not decrying the abilities of the present Governor General but he objected in principle because it made a political football of the office. "The first came from Ontario that means the next will have to be from Quebec. Will they ever get around to selecting a Governor General from Prince Edward Is-

land?" Premier Jones interjected that they might and the doctor immediately asked "Are you aiming that high?"

Asked by the Premier if he favored dropping of the use of the word "Dominion," Dr. MacMillan said "Next they will want to drop the Bible. That is where the word came from." He thought the Government of Canada had acted improperly in appointing a Canadian to such high post without first

consulting Parliament.

Dr. MacMillan, who was the only speaker heard in the debate yesterday, said in his speech asked permission to pass around one copy each of the London Illustrated News showing pictures of the ceremonies at the time of the funeral of King George Sixth, and of the C. N. R. Magazine which carried pictures on the visit to Canada of the Queen.

He congratulated the Premier on the early tabling of practically all departmental reports and he also congratulated Attorney General W. E. Darby on having banned from sale here "scurrilous, rotten and indecent literature." He said that obscene magazines had been coming through the mail and were sold at an alarming rate.

**Education**

Discussing education he said people complained of the home-work but they could only get an education by hard work instead of pushing a button or turning on a radio. He was surprised that not more young people took advantage of the Technical School and questioned Premier Jones' statement that all classrooms were full. "Sometimes I think we are getting it too easy for people to get an education."

In this connection he quoted from a Guardian editorial on Vital Education Issues which appeared on Tuesday of this week Dr. MacMillan in commenting on it noted that besides himself, others including the press, had noted a trend towards confusing higher education with professional and other occupational courses.

He did not agree with the giving of large scholarships in the third and fourth years at Prince of Wales College. He was afraid the tendency was towards making it a university and he said its primary function was as a normal school. He also said he thought there was no authority for using Federal grants for maintenance for scholarships.

In replying to criticism of the "Cancer" signs on the roads he said that the campaign against that disease was proving effective as the pathologist says laboratory tests at present show that the signs showing now indicate only early cancer which can generally be arrested.

It was just prior to six p.m. when Dr. MacMillan concluded. Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, moved the adjournment and will be the first speaker heard when the debate resumes this afternoon at 3 p.m.

**Comments Revised Statutes**

The speaker expressed his opinion that the Revised Statutes were a great piece of work for the Province and felt that there should be more recognition and a vote of thanks for the man responsible. He would support any movement to express appreciation to him. However, he said, not enough time had been allotted and the public servant doing the work had had to start early and work far into the night.

He also thought there was enough work in the Department of Health and Welfare for two men and complimented the Minister, Hon. A. W. Matheson on his complete grasp of detail of a job which would have caused worry to many a medical man. He also paid high tribute to W. E. Massey, Provincial Auditor, for his ability and to P. S. Fielding, Deputy Provincial Secretary. He also stated that the Public Servants of the Province were a splendid group of employees who got things done quickly and courteously.

The speaker was critical of the Federal-Provincial agreement and said none of those in the past had been good.

He traced past agreements and quoted from the Duncan and Rowell-Sirois reports. He also voiced a complaint that the Federal Government would not wipe out the \$9,000 a year paid by the Province for the Hillsborough Bridge while at the same time it cancelled debts of Saskatchewan for \$60 million as well as wiping out \$9 million owed by British Columbia. "All we can do in the Maritimes is export our brains for the benefit of the rest of Canada."

Critical, too, of the financing of Canadian Finance Minister Abbott and his \$700 million surplus, Dr. MacMillan said that the income and sales taxes "Are milking this poor old P. E. I. cow dry."

He maintained that a Provincial Museum should be a part of life here to save the many historical things from loss or destruction. However, he did not see how we could get it unless someone has an inspiration, like Mr. Robert L. Cotton had, and gives it to us.

**Retired To Stud**

PARIS, Ky., March 19 — (AP)—Hill Prince, whose turf winnings total \$422,140, was retired to stud today.

Hill Prince, owned by Christopher T. Cheney and sired by Prince Quillo out of Hill Bean, was the top two-year-old, the horse of the year as a three-year-old and the leading handicap horse as a four-year-old. He ran two races as a five-year-old, winning one, before his retirement.

**Ottawa Aid Needed**

He offered any help he might be able to give the Premier in obtaining more money from Ottawa because the Province is deserving of much more. And now, he said, no longer was it possible to appeal to the Privy Council that the terms of Confederation were not being carried out.

He read to members a letter he had received from the former Governor General who regretted that he had to leave Canada, but was doing so because he was needed in another job. The speaker, though, did not admire "the discourtesy" shown by Prime Minister St. Laurent to Dr. George Drew, Leader of the Progressive Conservative party, on the occasion of the homecoming of the new Governor General.

Discussing the Department of Health and Welfare he said that Dominion health grants had imposed serious duties on it. He thought the department had acquired some of the finest medical men available for the various tasks. "I presume to be a judge of men in my own profession," he said, in stating his belief there was not a better man in this country for the post than Dr. Harold Shaw. "He is a splendid pathologist and our only danger is that some other Province will offer him two or three times what we pay him here."

He held the same opinion of Dr. Eric Fould. "There is no better tuberculosis expert in Canada," Dr. MacMillan agreed that the health centre at Falconwood was an urgent necessity. It would increase the debt but it was absolutely necessary. Other provinces had worried about their governments taking over health matters but the medical profession here had no such worries. They had the utmost confidence in the Minister and could see great strides being made. He also referred to the excellent work being done at Falconwood by Mrs. Murchison, Theri-sult, and MacVicar.

Dealing briefly with the general hospitals he said he was glad the government proposed to increase the grants to them. He deplored the lack of municipal assistance such as is received in other places. Because the hospitals must be kept open even at the cost of having to raise extra money he thought it might be not a bad idea to "put another \$1 on a bottle of liquor" and might also raise the health tax.

He thought the world today was too much governed by sport and the general cry for entertainment at hockey games and horse races. He compared this mania with the feat of the boys of St. Dunstan's
