Auction For Crippled Children's Fund Tonight

The crippled children's auction being held at Yeo's Theatre, Montague, tonight, will mark the ninth successive year in which the St. Andrews Masonic Lodge has sponsored this worthy project successfully, and which has proven of benefit not only to children in Montague and vicinity, but to any children in need in Kings County and indeed throughout the Province.

After an auspicious beginning in 1947, this annual auction has increased in popularity and interest so that a large number of donations has always been received from people throughout the area, and a large number has always been present on auction night to buy these donations usually at a considerable saving.

During the past eight years the total proceeds have amounted to something over \$8,000.00 of which between \$6,000.00 and \$7,000.00 have been donated to the Red Cross Children's Hospital in Montreal for which a large portion has been spent for children in Kings County. The balance has been spent through cases after having been investigated.

This year the total proceeds will be held by St. Andrews Lodge, and donations will be made direct to the Red Cross.

Besides this work, St. Andrews Lodge also sends \$60.00 each year, a total of \$420.00 to the Crippled Children's Hospital in Montreal which takes care of all crippled children regardless of race, creed or color. It has also paid the transportation costs of patients to and from the hospital. The only expenditure outside these activities have been for purposes of advertising such auctions, and of necessary correspondence materials pertaining thereto. Thus all the proceeds of this auction with the exception of advertising, will go to the purpose for which it is intended.

Mr. R. K. Clements, committee chairman, said that a large crowd will be on hand tonight to bid on the many and excellent articles which will be placed up for auction. Only one thing will be required to make it a real success, and that will be bidding often and bidding strong, all with the object in view of supporting a worthwhile cause.
