## THE SENATE MAKES NO PROGRESS

With the Drummond Railway Deal.

SIR MACKENZIE BOWELL HOLDS THAT BOTH BILLS

Should be Considered Together and Not Separately.

OTTAWA, June 29.—The Senate made no headway with the Drummond Bill yesterday.

Mr. Bowell holds that the Drummond and Grand Trunk bills ought to be considered together, as senators cannot be expected to buy the Drummond Road, ending nowhere, unless they intend to evade the arrangement with the Grand Trunk.

Mills and Scott want to consider the bills separately though admitting that they are closely connected and that the adoption of one involves that of the other.

Both bills stand over to Thursday when probably the Grand Trunk bill will be taken up first.

Shamrock Still Aground.

Russians Massacred.

SHANGHAI, JUNE 27.—A Russian military party of twelve persons have been massacred by brigands in the Province of Kirin, Manchuria.

Reception to Girouard.

MONTREAL, JUNE 27.—A cablegram has been received from Major Girouard, who directs the railway policy of the British Government in Egypt, stating that he will arrive in Canada about the beginning of August. A movement is on foot here to tender the distinguished young Canadian officer a reception on his arrival.

"Tom Brown's School Days."

LONDON, June 27.—The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Rev. Frederick Temple, D. D., formerly headmaster of Rugby school, unveiled at Rugby, in the presence of a distinguished assembly, a statue erected to the memory of the late Thomas Hughes, C. C. He was the author of "Tom Brown's School Days," "Tom Brown at Oxford," etc., and founder of the British settlement of Rugby, Tenn.

## GOVERNMENT MAKE A MISTAKE

Over the Drummond Railway Deal

THE CANADA PACIFIC RAILWAY NOW REFUSES

To Renew Their Traffic Agreement With the Government

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, June 29.—There will be no renewal in any form of the agreement between the Government and the Canadian Pacific Railway with regard to running powers or traffic facilities for the Company over the Intercolonial Railway between St. John and Halifax.

T. C. Shaughnessy, President of the Canadian Pacific, has returned from Ottawa where he had a long interview with the Premier on Railway matters.

He says the Government have tied their hands forever, by the agreement they have made into with the Grand Trunk, from entering into traffic agreements with any company.

By one of the clauses of the agreement in connection with the acquisition and working of the Drummond County Railway, the Grand Trunk have secured for all time the right to every ton of traffic bound for the west that the I. C. R. brings into Montreal.

Mr. Shaughnessy thinks that the Government could not have understood the far reaching consequences of the agreement or they would never have consented to it.

He pointed this out to Sir Wilfrid Laurier yesterday, and added Shaughnessy: "I made it clear to him that the Government were debarred now from entering into any traffic arrangements with the Canadian Pacific. I fancy the question will be discussed from one end of the country to the other before we are many days older."

"I pointed out to the Premier that the best thing to do under the circumstances was to get Parliament to pass a bill abrogating the agreement."

Replaced by Englishmen.

LONDON, June 28.—Constantinople advises that a serious break has occurred in the friendship existing between Turkey and Germany. All the Germans in the Turkish arsenals and gun factories have been replaced by Englishmen. Dissatisfaction with the supplies furnished by Germany is given as the cause.

## THE COMMENCEMENT OF THE TROUBLE

In Connection With the French Shore

FRENCH SCHOONER PUTS INTO NEWFOUNDLAND PORT

Seized by Customs Officers, but Attacks Them and Escapes.

ST JOHN'S, Nfld, June 29.—The French fishing vessel Nouvelle Ecosse from the Grand Banks arrived at Cape Broyle on the southern coast of Newfoundland yesterday in quest of herring bait.

She was seized by customs officials for violation of fishing law.

An officer was given custody of the ship and crew, but the latter attacked him, got the ship to sea; and then threw him into a boat and left the coast.

The British war ship Columbia was ordered to chase and seize the Nouvelle Ecosse which has no register, that being in the hands of the customs officials.

Serious complications are feared as a result of this act.

Ambitious Young Canadians.

MONTREAL, JUNE 28.—Mr. A. A. Bruneau, M. P., for Richillieu, and a leading light in the Liberal party, is reported to have made a remarkable speech at a St. Jean Baptiste celebration held at St. Ours, which is in Mr. Bruneau's constituency. Mr. Bruneau, in substance, said:

I am glad to tell you that the Dominion of Canada is now ruled by French-Canadians. Yes, French-Canadians are now the leaders of Canada, and I will tell you their names. They are Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Joseph Israel Tarte, and A. A. Bruneau. The old times are passed away, and a new era has arrived. I wish that there was a representative of an Ontario newspaper present so that I could tell it to them. The French Canadians are now the rulers of Canada. Mr. Bruneau's ambition is to become a Cabinet Minister.

Marriage in Peru.

CALLAO, Peru, June 28.—The Provincial Council has presented a petition asking the Government to reconsider its recent decree relating to non-Catholic marriages, considering it to be contrary to the law, to the ideals of modern society, and highly prejudicial of the foreign colonies.

Domville on the Rocks.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 27.—Advice received by the Canadian Development Company tell of the total wreck at Thirty Mile of the big stern-wheel river steamer James B. Domville, owned by the Klondike and Stewart River Pioneers, Limited, an English syndicate, which bought her a few months ago for \$100,000. It was on her first trip of the season that the disaster occurred.

Fresh Differences.

LONDON, JUNE 27.—In the British House of Commons yesterday Mr. Broderick admitted that differences had arisen in the Newfoundland-French shore matter in regard to the question of bait. That, he said, was as much as he could say on the subject at present but he would make a further statement tomorrow.

Fresh Source of Conflict.

PARIS, JUNE 28.—The Figaro says the intervention of Commodore Gifford, commanding the British squadron in Newfoundland waters, has raised a fresh source of conflict, as France's action was justified by a law passed by the Newfoundland Parliament.

Change of Opinion in Rome.

ROME, JUNE 8.—For the first time since 1870 the Vatican party has obtained a majority in Rome in the municipal elections, and the fronts of the churches are fantastically illuminated nightly in honor of the success.

## SIR HIBBERT AND THE YUKON

Government Must Take the Matter up.

NOW THAT SIR HIBBERT HAS ACCEPTED THEIR CHALLENGE,

Government Cannot Refuse a Tribunal of Some Kind.

OTTAWA, JUNE 29.—Sir Hibbert Tupper devoted the whole of Wednesday afternoon to the further location of the Yukon mismanagement. Through Sir Wilfrid Laurier stipulated on Tuesday night that the Yukon debate should close yesterday he himself has proposed that it stand over.

The impression prevails that the Government has not yet decided how to meet the question, having in view the previous challenge of Ministers, so strongly made and so often repeated, for some member to take the personal responsibility of making specific and formal charges.

Now that this challenge has been accepted it is impossible for the Government to refuse a tribunal of some kind and it seems to be impossible that the enquiry could be conducted by a parliamentary committee sitting at Ottawa.

It is pretty certain that the Government will not submit the case to a commission of judges.

That would be unsafe for Sifton.

Lords and Women.

LONDON, JUNE 27.—The House of Lords yesterday defeated the bill legalizing the election of women as councillors and aldermen. The vote stood 182 against the measure and 68 in favor of it.

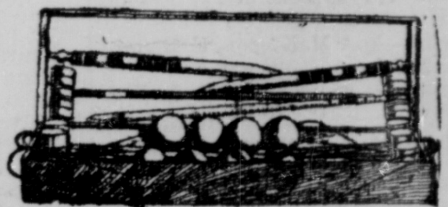
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
