

Millar Sensational As Islanders Score 5-3 Victory Over Miners

GLACE BAY, N. S., Jan. 18. (CP)—Charlottetown's agile Al Millar proved he's the best goalie in the Maritime Major Hockey League Saturday as his Islanders defeated Glace Bay Miners 5-3 in a cleanly played game here.

Millar, whose goals per game average is the league's best, played his finest game this season. Miners hammered 33 shots in his direction, and only three got through. Don Lockhart handled only 27.

Charlottetown tallied once in the first, outscored Miners 2-1 in the second and split with two goals each in the third.

Gary Gordon, Walt Paskyshyn, Bob Gray, Ronnie Hurst, and Hub Beaudry scored for Islanders and Miners' marksmen were Pop Backer, with two, and Hub Macey.

Back Whitlock, the league's top sniper, picked up one point, an assist on Paskyshyn's tally in the third.

Charlottetown now are eight points behind Halifax, and eight ahead of Sydney Millionaires. Miners are three points behind Mills.

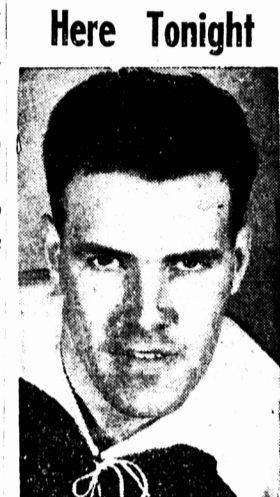

Horeck's Millionaires Return Tonight For Battle With Islanders

The Sydney Millionaires, who are still seeking the services of ex-Islander Phil Vitale, return here tonight to meet the Charlottetown Islanders in an M. M. H. L. game at the Forum.

There were still conflicting reports about Vitale last night. From New Glasgow Johnny Horeck told officials here that Vitale agreed to come to the Millionaires. Horeck reported that Vitale would join the club within two weeks. In the meantime he was planning to contact Vitale again in an attempt to get the big rear guard immediately in an earlier phone call yesterday evening Vitale stated that he was suffering from a bad foot.

On the other hand a Canadian Press despatch from Sydney last night stated the Sydney manage-

ment had not announced anything about Vitale being signed. The report indicated however, that Vitale might come to terms with the club shortly. His name has been added to the roster of the Moneyman.

The Millionaires, with their crowd pleasing brand of hockey will be well rested for the game this evening. Yesterday they moved to New Glasgow from where they will fly to the island today.

Club officials are hopeful that there will be a good turn-out of fans tonight. They point out that large attendances are needed at all games if the team is to keep operating.

The last time the Millionaires were here they came from behind to earn a 3-3 draw with the Islanders.

Howe's Goal Gives Red Wings 1-1 Tie With Habs

MONTREAL, Jan. 18. (CP)—Gordie Howe's 28th goal of the season—his first in Montreal in the 1952-53 campaign—gave Detroit Red Wings a 1-1 tie with Montreal Canadiens Saturday night in a hard-fighting National Hockey League game.

Howe scored from a wild scramble late in the third period while Maurice (Rocket) Richard was serving a major penalty. The tying tally came less than three minutes after Floyd Curry had tipped in a goal that broke a gruelling, scoreless deadlock of more than 55 minutes.

Fourteen penalties were called by referee Bill Chadwick including two major and a misconduct. Richard had four minors, one major and the misconduct, for a total of 23 minutes. Canadiens drew nine of the 14 penalties.

Goalies Terry Sawchuk of the Wings and Gerry McNeil of Canadiens played brilliantly and both appeared headed for shutouts. But with less than five minutes to go, Dick Gamble sent a long pass to John McCormack who whipped over a perfect goal-mouth pass on which Curry scored.

The crowd of 14,523 waited hopefully for the end. Then Richard cross-checked Marcel Pronovost and the Detroit defenceman slumped to the ice, bleeding about the face. Richard was given a major

penalty. When he skated back before entering the box and shoved Ted Lindsay, referee Chadwick added a misconduct.

Canadiens hung on for two minutes against Detroit's terrific power play. Howe, Red Kelly and Metro Prystai rifled shots at McNeil. After one by Kelly there was a big scramble outside the goal crease, with McNeil on the ice, and Howe shoved the puck over the line.

Glen Skov of the Red Wings drew a major penalty in the third period when his stick caught Doug Harvey near the mouth and drew blood.

Canadiens Score 3-2 Victory Over Red Wings

DETROIT, Jan. 18. (CP)—Ken Modell and Billy Reay of the second-place Montreal Canadiens scored third-period goals tonight to break a 1-1 tie and win the first-place Detroit Red Wings a 3-2 National Hockey League defeat before 13,303 fans, largest local crowd of the season.

It was the third time the Wings, who now hold a five-point lead over Montreal, had been beaten on home ice this season.

Maurice Richard scored Montreal's opening goal in the second period. Marty Pavelich and Gordie Howe tallied for Detroit, with Howe's goal, late in the third period, setting off a desperate but futile effort to tie the score.

Mosdell clicked at 45 seconds of the third period to break the 1-1 deadlock. Richard had tried a solo dash, but was checked 25 feet from the net and the puck floated off his stick. Modell skated straight in and rammed it home.

At 3:45 of the final period, Dillard St. Laurent tried a 70-footer. Reay deflected the puck towards the net and goalie Terry Sawchuk muffed the soft shot.

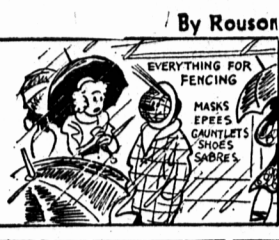

Boston In 2-1 Victory Over Toronto Maple Leafs

BOSTON, Jan. 18. (CP)—Veteran winger Woody Dumart's 45-foot goal in the second period tonight gave Boston a 2-1 National Hockey League victory over Toronto Maple Leafs. The Bruins snapped a five-game losing streak.

Dumart stole the puck from Toronto defenceman Jimmy Morrison at mid-ice, swept across the blue line and fired to put Boston ahead 2-0. The score came 10 seconds after Boston was penalized for having an extra man on the ice.

Fern Flaman, Leaf defenceman, pulled his club within one goal, at 2-1, with a brilliant solo dash in the finale. He took a Boston rebound deep in his own end, blocked by Bruins Bill Quackenbush and then fired a 15-footer past goalie Jim Henry.

Winger Real Chevrelis sent the Bruins into a 1-0 advantage in the opening session, banging the disc past Harry Lumley after taking a goalmouth pass from Milt Schmidt.

That score ended Lumley's un-scored-on string at 153 minutes 14 seconds. It was the Bruins' first goal in 105 minutes and 54 seconds of play.

Boston now has won 16 games, seven of 10 from the Leafs, usually one of the toughest clubs for them to whip.
