Alberton Woodturning Display To Be Featured

SUMMERIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN The Summerside Lobster Carnival this year will feature the distinctive craftsmanship of Herb Leavitt, of Alberton, whose "Maple Tree Craft" brand of woodwork has won recognition throughout Canada for its exceptional quality.

Mr. Leavitt will be a guest tonight on the TV program "Gazette", where he will be interviewed in regard to his specialized craft, and his first public demonstration of the art to be seen at the Summerside Lobster Carnival in July.

The Leavitt display will be located within the carnival headquarters at the stadium, and will feature samples of the various products made by this plant, and will also have on hand the necessary specialized woodworking equipment to show the various stages of manufacture from the rough wood to the finished product.

This industry, almost a family operation, began as a child-hobby when Mr. Leavitt was given a small hobby wood working set by his parents who encouraged him in the development of his natural talent in this field, by buying the items he made.

Late with serving with the RCAF he continued his wood-working interest, and when he returned home he renewed his interest with so much success and satisfaction that he began making it a means of livelihood.

Each article is given a two coat finish of a very high grade lacquer which is resistant to ordinary household acids and detergents.

The polishing is done by rotating the article and holding against it a fine abrasive polish and then buffing with a soft cloth to develop the satiny texture of the wood.

The speed of production has been greatly increased by the unique application of a special chisel designed by Mr. Leavitt to hold the wooden blank of disc to the lathe.

O'LEARY—A net profit of more than \$20,000 was reported at the 23rd annual meeting of the O'Leary Farmers Co-operative Association Ltd. Wednesday night.

General manager, Ralph Bishop, read the auditors' report which showed that sales had increased by \$7,000 during the year. A dividend of three per cent was paid to shareholders.

He also gave a comparison of sales and gross profit for each year with the previous department with the previous year's standings.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The defence department said Thursday there have been six instances since the fall of the oceanic cables and breaks in the oceanic communications cable to Thule, Greenland, site of a ballistic missile warning station, but none appears to have been made deliberately.
