## Hopes Session Will Be Short

It was stated yesterday by Premier Alex Campbell that he had discussed the special session of the Legislature with Opposition Leader Walter Shaw and he also relayed Mr. Shaw's hope that it would be a short session.

Mr. Campbell expects that it will take a day and a half to deal with the agenda.

Premier Campbell stated that if the opposition agrees to dis-

pense with the usual rules of the House, then the session can be speeded up.

Normally, it takes three days to handle a bill. It is hoped that if the opposition disposes with the regular procedures, the various bills may receive three readings in one day.

Nomination of a House speaker will be one of the first items of business.

## Edmund Arsenault, Guest Speaker At Rotary Club

A lecture on Agricultural Chemicals Distribution was given at the Charlottetown Rotary Club's meeting today at the Charlottetown Hotel by Edmund Arsenault.

The subject was divided into three groups: fungicides, insecticides, and herbicides. He stated that the resistance of insects to chemical insecticides is a major problem, and that although insecticides are poisonous, they are classified as a necessary evil.

"Experience indicates that if insecticides were banned, the world would face immediate starvation," he said. "There has been some controversy about the use of insecticides, more especially in the destruction of wild life animals, fish and birds. It is true, but somewhat exaggerated." He stated that a very small amount of forest land has been sprayed in both the U.S. and Canada.

Pesticides, deal with chemical weed control and weed killers are used on more than 70

million acres of farm lands in the U.S., mostly on grain plantings. In Canada the sale of herbicides, amounts to \$17,193,643 annually.

Dr. Kenneth Parker, Superintendent of Schools, followed Mr. Arsenault, with an address on Charlottetown's Centennial Project, high school bands. Two youth bands have been formed in this province, at Kensington and Summerside. Dr. Parker stated, "Our City Council has en-

thusiastically endorsed the project and both Provincial and Federal Centennial Grant Committees, have given their approval. It is estimated that it will cost \$36,000 to equip three bands, one each at Birchwood and Queen Charlotte High Schools and a Senior band at Colonel Gray Senior High School."

The Rotary Club will sponsor a visit to Charlottetown by the Mt. Allison Choral Society on March 18, which will perform at the Confederation Centre. The club also decided to donate \$1,000 from the Rotary Auction Fund to the Rehabilitation Council.

## Heavy Damage In 3 Accidents

SUMMERSIDE — The Summerside Detachment of the RCMP reported that three accidents which occurred over the weekend resulted in approximately \$1,000 damages.

A two-car collision at Summerside East early Saturday morning resulted in estimated damage of \$700. Bernard Lloyd Crose, CFB, Summerside, driving a 1964 Envoy, and James Louis Warren of Borden, operating a 1960 Pontiac, were involved in the mishap.

Two accidents within 15 minutes of each other Friday afternoon resulted at Richmond when cars went off the road due to icy and slushy road conditions.

At 3:45 p.m., a 1959 Chevrolet operated by Daniel Joseph Chaisson of St. Edward, went off the road, and at 4 p.m., a 1959 Simca, operated by Bud Ramsay of Summerside lost control and went off the road. In each accident an estimated \$300 damage was caused.
