

Giants Beat Milwaukee; Redlegs Defeat Pirates

Winless Dick Littlefield finally got the job done as the last place New York Giants knocked off Milwaukee 2-1 Wednesday and led the Braves' National League lead to 7 1/2 games.

Third place Cincinnati, with the help of three unearned runs, made it nine in a row over Pittsburgh, 6-3, to come within three games of Milwaukee.

The Chicago Cubs defeated Philadelphia 8-3.

In the American, Al Rosen's double error on one play showed the New York Yankees into a 3-2 decision over Cleveland and re-

turned their lead over the second place Indians to 8 1/2 games. Billy Pierce won his 18th as the third placed Chicago White Sox defeated Boston 6-3 in the first game of a day-night doubleheader.

RHODES BREAKS TIE
Dusty Rhodes' sixth-inning single broke a 1-1 tie and gave Littlefield his first victory in six decisions. Rookie Taylor Phillips lost it. Both clubs failed on squeeze bunt attempts in the seventh. Hoyt Wilhelm mopped up for the Giants, winning only their fourth from the Braves in 20 games, after Littlefield had given nine hits in seven innings.

Three runs in the sixth, on two of Pittsburgh's four errors and doubles by Johnny Temple and Frank Robinson, gave Cincinnati its edge and Joe Nuxhall lost his 13th, giving up Gus Bell's 24th home run with none on in the third.

Only two of the Cubs' seven runs off Harvey Haddix in four innings were earned. Bob Rush won it with a five-hitter for a 12-6 record. Haddix is 11-5. Willie Jones hit a two-run homer for the Phils with Pete Whisenand socking a solo job for the Cubs.

Pierce won his 18th on the fifth try.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Detroit batted Washington's Dean Stone for six runs in the first inning Wednesday night and coasted to an easy 9-5 victory over the Senators. The victory went to Paul Foytack, his 10th.

BOSTON (AP) — Boston's Billy Consolo bounced a bases-loaded single off the mound—his first hit of the year—in the ninth inning Wednesday night for a 6-5 victory over Chicago. The doubleheader. The Boston bonus boy's blow revived the collapsing Red Sox.

The White Sox won the opener 6-3 as Ron Northey's sacrifice fly and Fred Hatfield's two-run homer in the eighth inning spelled triumph No. 18 for southpaw Billy Pierce.

Marilyn To Make Second Attempt At Strait Today

VICTORIA (CP) — Toronto's Marilyn Bell will make her second attempt to swim Juan de Fuca strait today, taking off from the Washington state side for Victoria.

Marilyn, 18-year-old swim ace, beaten by the strait 12 days ago, will attempt to bring her Lakeshore Swim Club and Canada a two-way victory over the strait. Clubmate Cliff Lumsdon completed an 11 1/2 hour swim from

Victoria's Horseshoe Bay to Green Point on the American shore last Friday for the first north-south crossing in history.

Marilyn now can become the first Canadian to make the south-north crossing and will be aiming at Bert Thomas' record. Thomas was the first person to swim from Port Angeles, Wash., to Victoria. His time was 11 hours 17 minutes. Marilyn will again have coach

Gus Ryder supervising the swim from a boat and will be guided by Capt. Ellice Cavin, navigator, in her first swim and in Lumsdon's victory.

DETERMINED TO WIN
Marilyn will start on a small ebb tide that is calculated to take her slightly to the west for several hours. At the end of the ebb and the start of the flood, it is planned to have her a mile to the east and south of Race Rocks so that the flood tide will take her northeast toward Victoria.

Harris Still Remembers That Ch'town Jr. Squad

Many local sport fans, despite the evidence which for years has been piling up against the theory, still have an extremely low opinion of our Island athletes as compared to athletes from other parts of Canada and even the Maritimes. Yet we have had olympic champions here. We have sent great fighters to all parts of the U.S. and Canada where they more than held their own with the best of their time. The baseball players who left here to perform elsewhere, in many cases have turned out to be the best players in their various leagues; for example Don MacLeod, who in his first season of H.D. League competition was the best of the two outstanding players performing in a college league in Boston.

Forbes Kennedy is another outstanding example of an Islander who became tops on his team. For in the three years he toiled for the Montreal Junior Canadiens he was never anything less than a regular and in his last year, regular and hockey hawks like Dick Irvin saw him as the best in the Canadian's Junior organization.

All this is leading up to a short conversation we had with Charlie Ryan after he returned from a vacation to Montreal recently. Charlie was telling us that while in Montreal he dropped into the dressing room of the Montreal Royals for a chat with Billy Harris. Montreal's gift to the International League Billy didn't have any trouble remembering Charlie. He was hurrying for the Dieppe Junior Cardinals.

Back in about '46 or '49 the Cardinals and Charlottetown team were tangled in a series for the

N.B.P.E.L. title. In that series Harris took quite a battering from K. of C. hitters and he never quite forgot it. He considered that junior team as one of the toughest he ever faced and was particularly interested in the whereabouts of Jack Spay, Ready and Glen Matheson. In his opinion both these local players were potential big leaguers and he was sorry to hear that they hadn't followed baseball as a career.

This is just a little further evidence that our ball players are a good bit better than we residents of the Island seem to think they are.

A word of congratulations might be in order for Barry Moore and his roaring Lions who Tuesday evening bounced the Basica Youth Club 5-3 to take the City League softball championship 4-1. This is the first City League title for Barry since the league was organized some years ago.
