### THE NOSE LASTS LONGEST.

She comes back to her home and people laden with the varied experiences of missionary life, and in her own pleasing way delights her hearers.

Lieut Colonel Sir Henry Edward McCallum, R. E., K. C. M. G., who has just been appointed governor of Newfoundland, in succession to Sir Herbert Harley Murray, K. C. B., has had a somewhat distinguished career as an officer of engineers. When private secretary to Sir William Jervois, the governor of the Straits Settlements, he prepared a project for the defence of Singapore, and later he became superintending engineer to the admiralty works in Hong Kong. In 1878 he was selected to proceed to Singapore to adopt measures for the defence of the port, and again in 1885 he was appointed to construct the new fortifications there. As an administrator, Sir Henry has had less experience, the governorship of Lagos being the only post he has held which was not more or less of a military character.
