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Report Increase In Russian Fishing Off Canadian Coast

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bureau of Commercial Fisheries Monday said various sources outside the U.S. have been reporting increased Russian fishing activity in the northwest Atlantic, including the eastern part of the Grand Banks.
Spokesmen said they knew of no direct information, however, to substantiate the reports.
H. M. Bearse, acting chief of the branch of Market News, cited information found in a Norwegian periodical entitled Fiskets Gang, which said:
"Fishing activity in the northwest Atlantic by Russian vessels is obviously increasing."
"According to a broadcast in Norwegian by Radio Moscow, large trawlers from Murmansk now fish as far west in the Atlantic as Greenland and Newfoundland waters."
"Further, it was broadcast that the U.S.S.R. Polar Institute in recent years has tried to find new fishing grounds in the west Atlantic; on the eastern part of the Grand Banks of Newfoundland ocean perch fishing grounds were

Think Khrushchev Still Angling For Two-Power Talks

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (Reuters) — Some NATO foreign ministers returned home Thursday with the impression Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev is still angling for a two-power summit conference with President Eisenhower.
This idea was in the back of the minds of many delegates during the three-day conference of foreign ministers which ended Wednesday night.
Throughout diplomatic exchanges with the West over the last year, Russia has kept open the possibility of direct talks with the United States. The majority of NATO countries, it is believed, would strongly oppose a conference of this kind.
A member of one of the continental European NATO powers said it would have the psychological effect of increasing the "inferiority complex" of European members toward the United States.
If the talks failed, it was argued, Russia would blame the United States and help to fan

discovered and named the "Sverdlovsk Banks."
Stewart Springer, chief of the branch of exploratory fishing, said he saw a Russian fishing film last fall while in Hamburg, Germany, which purported to show a Russian vessel fishing on the Grand Banks.
Fish and wildlife service officials said there is no legal restriction against fishing by the Russians on the high seas in the Grand Banks area as long as they stay outside territorial waters.

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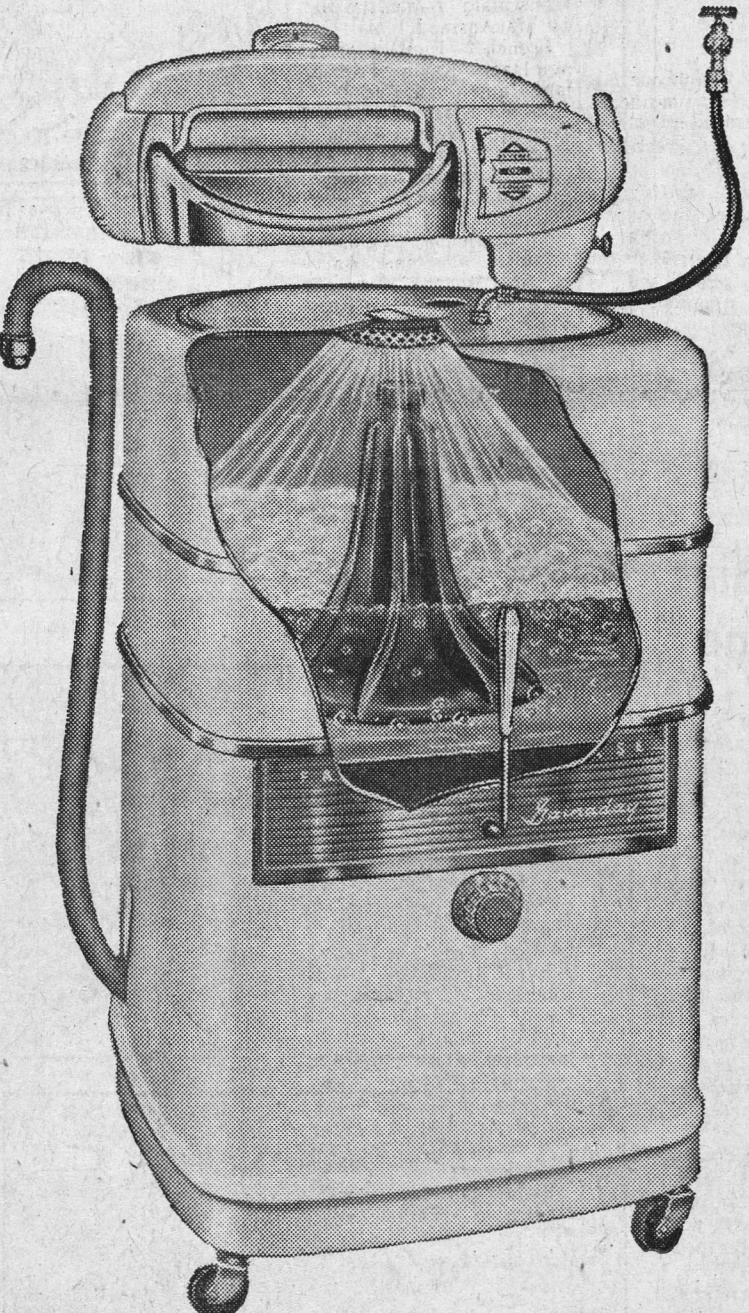
