## THE MAN WHO KEEPS HIS WORD

"The Indians of the North-west in making a chief, are accustomed to select a phrase consisting of several words indicating some marked characteristic. The people of Manitoba, following this Indian custom, have nick-named Hugh John Macdonald, the Man Who Keeps His Word.

Speaking of the Conservative prospects in the West, Premier Macdonald said he was convinced the Conservative party would carry every one of the seven or eight seats west of the lakes."

In Quebec the New Liberals have now a following of 49 out of 65 members, and Mr. Tarte claims that, in the coming elections, they will gain one seat. The more reasonable men of the party, however, admit a loss, and the Liberal-Conservatives expect, with good reason, to reduce the Quebec majority considerably. The delay in issuing the writs by the Government, shows that the members desire to put off the fatal day as long as possible.

## EXHIBITION AND RACES.

The time is drawing near for the exhibition and races. The former opens on Tuesday the 25th inst. For the first time on this Island exhibits from the three provinces will be placed side by side, and let the best win. The time for entering exhibits in all classes, except agricultural and horticultural products, fisheries, ladies' fancy work, art work and cotton goods, expires on Tuesday next, the 18th inst., the latter classes close on Friday the 21st inst.

Entries are coming in rapidly from the other provinces as well as this province. The horse races will take place on Wednesday and Thursday, the 26th and 27th instants. On Wednesday, the first day, the following races will take place: Three minute class, trot, purse \$150.00; 2:35 class, trot and pace, purse \$100.00; and 2:24 class, trot, purse \$250.00.

On Thursday, the second day of the races there will be a 2:28 class, trot, purse \$200.00, the grand free-for-all trot with the largest purse ever offered on this Island, viz: \$400.00, and a 2:45 class, trot, purse \$150.00.

The entries to these races close on Wednesday next, the 19th inst.

As the St. John and Halifax races will then have been over our races will likely be the last large races this season, and all the fast horses in the maritime provinces are expected to be here for the last great test of their speed this year.

The exhibition will be kept open all day and till late each night. There will also be a great display of fireworks on the nights of Wednesday and Thursday, the 26th and 27th, the like of which has never been seen here before.

The very lowest railway fares and cheap excursion rates on steamboats from all points during the exhibition and races.

There will be many other attractions which will be advertised in a few days.

The admission fee has been made low and within the reach of all, and as the exhibition and races will be the grand event of the season all should make it a point to attend.

The exhibition and race grounds will be magnificently lighted each night by electricity by Mr. Waddell, the manager here of the Royal Electric Light Company of Montreal.
