LOSS OF THE ROLAND - Capt. Finlayson, master of the bark, Roland, before reported abandoned at sea while on a voyage from Cienfuegos for Delaware Breakwater, according to a London despatch, reports that heavy weather was experienced, during which the masts were carried away and boats smashed. The vessel labored heavily having fallen into the trough of the sea and finally sprang a leak. The pumps were manned and were kept going constantly for five days, but despite the efforts to keep the barque free the water gained on the pumps and it was with the greatest difficulty that the vessel was kept afloat. It was finally decided that the barque must be abandoned, but as the boats had been so broken that they were utterly useless, the only thing that could be done was to await the coming of some vessel that would take the crew off. At the end of five days, and when all hands were almost completely exhausted by their work at the pumps, steamer Daconvor, Ball, from New Orleans for Liverpool, sighted the barque, and seeing that something was wrong with her, she came down to her, and in a short time took the crew off. When the barque was abandoned she was 250 miles from Cape Hatteras.

COURT OF CHANCERY - The Court of Chancery was engaged for the last week hearing the suit brought by McKinnon & McLean, and Mark Wright & Co., judgment creditors of Henry T. LePage, against the Gowdy Manufacturing Co., of Guelph, Ont., to set aside an absolute conveyance and assignment of the real and personal property of LePage which he made to the Company last February. It will be remembered that LePage who carried on an extensive trade in agricultural implements, failed last winter, being largely indebted to a number of people both here and elsewhere. He made an assignment of his business to the Gowdy Company who accepted it as payment of their claim. The other creditors considered that the Gowdy Company got more value for their debt than it was worth, in other words that the consideration was inadequate as to be fraudulent, and thereupon commenced the present proceedings to have the transaction declared void, or to have it declared to stand as a security only, and not as a purchase, and to have a receiver appointed. The case occupied the attention of the Court since last Thursday and until yesterday when an arrangement was arrived at by which the Gowdy Manufacturing Co. agreed to give up all that they received from LePage upon payment of LePage's indebtedness to them. The costs of the suit to be in the discretion of Vice-Chancellor Hensley. In giving judgment the Vice-Chancellor stated that Messrs. McKinnon & McLean, Mark Wright & Co., and the Gowdy Manufacturing Company were honest and worthy parties, and he also said he wished to express to the counsel, Messrs. M. McLeod and Hodgson for complainants and A. Peters and W. S. Stewart for defendants, his appreciation of the calm and patient manner in which they conducted this tedious and intricate case.

The United States and Railway Interests.

LONDON, April 23.

The London Canadian Gazette states that it learns on good authority from Washington that the United States government does not intend to modify the present system of consular sealing more than is necessary to protect revenue and railway interests in the North and Western States. The Gazette says that its information is to the effect that this will not sensibly interfere with freight over the boundary between Canada and the United States.

The bride is the daughter of the late John W. Nicholson, wine merchant, and is quite rich in her own right. They will reside in England. A large party came over from Halifax to witness the ceremony.

Benjamin Burr, partner of Congressman Bonlette, publisher of Bangor Whig, died to-day, aged seventy. He was one of the best known men in Maine.

MORE HORSES - Another valuable lot of horses were shipped in the steamer to Picton this morning.

GOODS STOLEN - The clothing store of Messrs. Wright & Strong, at Summerside, had a pane of glass broken from the front window last Tuesday night and a half dozen shirts and some neckties stolen therefrom.

WE are informed by the Post Office Inspector that the regular mail service by the Canadian line of steamers has been discontinued for the present, and that all matter for the United Kingdom will in future be forwarded via New York, with the exception of parcels.

FIRST OF THE SEASON - The schr. Lady May, Capt. Finlay McDougall, left here for Belle Creek on Tuesday morning, and returned yesterday afternoon. The Lady May is the first sailing vessel moving this year. Capt. McDougall reports no ice on the island shore, but there is, apparently, considerable ice in and about Wallace.

ODDFELLOWS EXCURSION - A number of train tickets have already been taken for the Oddfellows excursion to Summerside, on Monday. To avoid a rush at the train, these tickets may be had at the Diamond Block, or from members of the order. The round fare is only \$1. A portion of the concert hall has been reserved for the Charlottetown contingent.

THEY'RE COMING BACK - According to a recent despatch from Montreal, more than 1,000 French Canadians have returned from the New England States to Montreal and surrounding country within the last fortnight, and the movement still continues. Strange to say, however, the Witness and L'Electeur, while faithfully chronicling every man who leaves the province, do not give a line to the much larger number now returning to their old homes. The greater number of the people have decided to take up land in Eastern Ontario, Lake St. John and the Northwest. They all say that times are very poor on the other side of the line, and that factory hands have the greatest difficulty to make both ends meet.
