

Educated Unemployed Problem Seen Building Up To Crisis

MONTREAL (CP) — A UNESCO conference was told Thursday that the problem of the educated unemployed is building up "social dynamite" in the major cities of Asia, Africa and Latin America.

The report was made by Philip H. Coombs, an American who heads the International Institute for Educational Planning. The institute, a UNESCO offshoot, has its headquarters in Paris.

Mr. Coombs said an apparent over-production of school and university graduates in some underdeveloped countries does not necessarily mean too much education—neither the explanation nor the cure was that simple.

"Education is seen by the impatient masses, long at the bottom of the socio-economic heap, as the upward ladder for their children. For them, freedom and democracy mean the promise of educational opportunity—not eventually but right away."

The institute director said, however, that much of the education being given is not contributing either to the individual or the emerging nation itself.

"A typical phenomenon is the over-production of lawyers and arts graduates and the under-production of scientists, engineers and other technically trained persons needed to modernize the economy, the government and education itself."

Mr. Coombs listed three priority tasks to be tackled by world education in the coming years. These are, he said, the better linkage of education to the priority needs of economic growth and social development, a more balanced and selective expansion of the educational system and, third, the energetic involvement of essential changes and improvements within the educational system.

Mr. Coombs was addressing a conference of the Canadian National Commission for UNESCO—the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.

Mr. Watson was the first president of the Prince Edward Island Builders' Exchange, is a past vice-president of the Canadian Construction Association for New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and has served on the P.E.I. Apprenticeship Advisory Board. He is currently president of the Association of Professional Engineers of Prince Edward Island and chairman of the Prince Edward Island branch of the Engineering Institute of Canada.

Mr. Coombs said the worldwide tidal wave of educational expansion did not happen simply because political leaders decided more education would be a good thing for their country.

Casualty Course Has Four Grads

Four people are qualified in Prince Edward Island to fracture arms, break wrists, feet,

fingers and toes, and crush practically all internal organs as a direct result of a casualty simulation course which was conducted for the past seven weeks at the Charlottetown Red Cross. These accidents are not real, only exact copies of actual injuries complete with artificial skin, plasticine and imitation blood.

The course was conducted under the sanction of the emergency health department of Civil Defense and instructors were Sinclair Cutcliffe and Mrs. Adeth Smith. Casualty simulation is used in hospital demonstrations, first aid and rescue work, and provides students with a realistic idea of what a specific injury should look like.

Every type of injury was covered in the course of 30 hours duration and successful students can now aid hospitals and rescue teams in practical demonstrations. Orin Simons, provincial co-ordinator for Civil Defense, and Dr. John Gillis, deputy chief emergency health department, presented certificates to the four successful candidates at the end of last evening's session.
