South Africa and the East

ASHAMED OF THEMSELVES.

The special correspondent of the
New York Tribune says:—The Boers
seem to have been ashamed of their
hasty retreat from Lydenburg, for, ac-
cording to the London Daily Mail cor-
respondent, at Maritzburg, they re-
turned after the town was occupied by
the British and shelled the place from
the neighboring heights without effect.
There is no reliable indication as to
the whereabouts or intentions of
Kruger, but at Lorenzo Marques it is
reported that he is still at Nelspruit.
He is said to be calling in arms with
the object of surrendering. The Portu-
guese are strongly reinforcing Rosano
Garcia, just across the border. No
reason for this action is given, but it
is believed that a rush of Transvaal
fugitives is anticipated, and encroach-
ment of Portuguese territory is con-
sequently feared.

In Orange River Colony matters are
not going altogether favorably for the
British, who have, it is stated in a Lon-
don Daily Mail telegram, evacuated in
the past week Senekal, Bethlehem,
Fouriesberg and Ladybrand.

A WARNING.

Lord Roberts has issued a pro-
clamation to the inhabitants of the
Orange River Colony, in which he
says that in consequence of annexa-
tion, they are now subjects of those
who were attached to commandoes
prior to the issuance of the annexation
proclamation, and who have since
been continuously in arms and at-
tached to commandoes. These, when
captured, will be treated as prisoners of
war. Those who have taken the oath
of submission, and who have broken it,
will be punished with death, imprison-
ment, or fine. Buildings harbouring the
enemy are liable to be raised. A
farm or farms in the vicinity of which
the railway is damaged will be liable to
be fined half a crown per morgen.
The inhabitants are warned to acquaint
the British forces of the presence of
the enemy, otherwise they will be re-
garded as abetting them, and will be
treated as rebels.

secretary of the United States legation,
and superintended the defensive opera-
tions when the amalgamated legations
'held the fort' at the British Embassy.

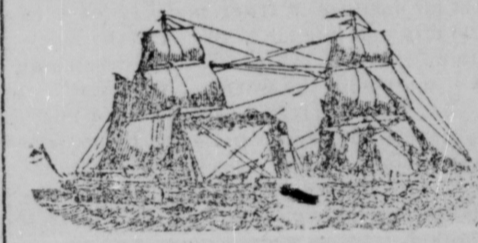
