love is opposed to love of God and of neighbor; wrong in calling it self-love. Our error is in thus naming it as love. The fact that we have not understood the real nature either of "Love" or "self". We can base our treatment of this subject on the rather accurate description of love as "wishing good to someone." The highest type of this love, excepting the mutual and eternal love of the Trinity, is God's love of man as manifested in both the natural and supernatural order.

In the natural order He wishes good to man by wishing him good and existence and the consequent natural perfections; in the supernatural order by wishing him supernatural good; namely, grace and the infused virtues. In both cases God wishes good to man effectively, i.e., His love for man effects or produces the good in man. NATURAL GOOD. Man, too, can wish good to someone in both these ways. He can wish his neighbour the supernatural good of grace and charity as the means of eternal salvation or natural good such as health and material necessities insofar as these are ordained to his salvation.

beginning of this article are worthy of belief. We can see now that we cannot truly love self without consequent growth in goodness. It would seem to follow logically then that the more we love our true self the greater will be our goodness and holiness. For this is nothing else but the love of God for we love God by His will in our regard. His will is revealed to us in the words of Scripture, "This is the will of God, your sanctification." Thus we see that self-love, far from being opposed to love of God, is inseparable from it. We might even say that it is the only way we have of manifesting our love of God. The supreme importance of our own personal sanctification becomes evident. We can grasp better, too, the truth of the apparent paradox contained in the words of the Divine Master when He said, "He who saves his life will lose it; but he who loses his life for My sake will find it."

Such a man may desire also the good pertaining to his sensitive nature but only in so far as it serves the rational or spiritual, that is to say, he eats to live and lives for eternity. He, however, who desires and seeks only the good pertaining to his sensitive or corporeal nature or even intellectual good as an end itself, without any order to the spiritual, does not love self but only what he thinks to be self. MESS OF POTTAGE. In fact, it would seem that such a man really hates self, since the apparent good which he wishes himself is opposed to his true eternal good and consequently is an evil. Faust was really hating his true self, in asking youth, wealth and pleasure from the devil, because he was trading his eternal soul and happiness for goods which soon pass away; as we read in Scripture, he was selling his birthright for a mess of pottage. There are untold millions of such shortsighted people like him in the world today. It now begins to be apparent that the statements made at the

THE WEEK AT S. D. U.

The Thanksgiving holidays (so slow in coming) have strained their way into conclusion and the hustle and bustle which had slackened off for a few brief days has inveterately resumed. The rite of posting the examination schedule following the Thanksgiving break has come with undue awareness, and many bright faces have changed their expressions to a pale green upon mere mention of the exam. However, the inner sanctum of peace will assume its normal palpitation as principle gradually overshadows circumstance and the tomes of knowledge will be opened.

DEBATING
While the majority of students were enjoying the (Thanksgiving) weekend at home, final preparations were being made to inaugurate the annual conference of the Maritime Intercollegiate Debating League which was held here at St. Dunstan's. This event, in which the college was host to fifteen delegates representing eight universities enrolled in the M.I.D.L., was undoubtedly a highlighting one for St. Dunstan in this year's activities. For the significance of the occasion is marked by the fact that this was the first time that S.D.U. has acted host to more delegates.

The unique aspect of the conference was the fact that it was the briefest and probably the most successful conference on record. The Rector, Father Sullivan, welcomed the conference delegates to the campus and the president of the Students' Union, George Mullally, extended a welcoming greeting on behalf of the student body, and commented briefly on the importance of the organization's role in the college program and in the far-reaching good effects which it brings forth. The presentation was made of the Abegweit Debating trophy, which was donated and put up for competition by S.D.U. in 1954, to last year's Maritime winner, Dalhousie. As a result of the conference, provisions are now being made to include at least one of the scheduled debates to be broadcast. Although only one session was deemed necessary, all the topics on the agenda for discussion were affectionately handled and the S.D.U. executive of the M.I.D.L., acting as official host, deserves a great deal of credit in conducting the conference and bringing it to a successful conclusion.

The first hockey meeting was held recently to formulate plans for the coming season, which promises to be a big one. A look at the gymnasium activities tells us that the basketball prospects are already going through their paces in the preliminary grind of gymnastics. The band, which was first established on the campus here last year, is beginning to develop in a unit, and under the direction of Mr. Rogers, is showing signs of rapid advancement and promise. Enthusiastic supporter of the band, Father Kelly, a supervisor and hopes to materialize one or more performances for the musical aggregate when the occasion comes up.
