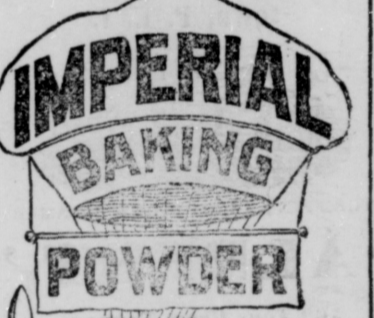

## Ottawa Letter.

INTERESTING TO FARMERS—THE CAPES ROUTE.

Before the Agricultural Committee on Friday last, Prof. Fletcher gave interesting evidence respecting the attacks of the horn fly on cattle, and the potato disease.

In reply to Mr. McLean, of P. E. I., the Professor said that if potatoes, after they were dug, were sprinkled with what is known as the Bordeaux mixture—which consists of bluestone and lime dissolved in water according to a formula that is well known—and then left in small piles to dry before they were housed or cellared, this would prove beneficial and to a very considerable extent prevent the decay that subsequently took place in so many instances, by which farmers and shippers suffered so much loss.

Mr. A. C. Macdonald also ascertained that the application of the Bordeaux mixture on the plants while growing had a most beneficial effect in preventing rot before the potatoes were dug.

Respecting the horn fly that lately has been noticed attacking the cattle of Ontario and other sections of Canada, and which is known to be a native of Europe—Prof. Fletcher gave an interesting account of the appearance and habits of this pest.

Mr. Perry spoke vigorously with respect to the wharf at Cape Traverse, and pointed out that the expenditure at Cape Tormentine was of little use without the connecting link on P. E. Island.
