REV. MOTHER GERARD
Mother Gerard of Providence, a former member of the general council of the Sisters of Providence, died December 30, 1958 at Mt. St. Vincent. She was 76.
Mother Gerard, whose name was Carlotta Bambrick McLellan was formerly from Glenroy Prince Edward Island. She attended St. Catherine's College, St. Paul, Minn., Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., and received her master's degree in English in summer sessions at Gonzaga University.
