CONVENT DE NOTRE DAME.

Annual Exhibition of Painting, Drawing and Needlework.

The annual exhibition of painting, drawing, needlework, etc., at the Convent de Notre Dame, began on Saturday afternoon and will close this afternoon. The display in every department is in the highest degree creditable alike to teachers and pupils and speaks more eloquently than words as to the thoroughness of the instruction imparted. The exhibition has been viewed by large numbers of people and all have been delighted with the showing that is made.

The large assortment of plain sewing by the little tots indicates a proficiency that is surprising, and the showing made by the more advanced pupils in ulala sewing and embroidery is excellent in every particular.

The showing of drawings and paintings is large, and the skill displayed by the young ladies whose work is on view is most praiseworthy. The exhibitors in this department are Misses V. Macdonald, Florrie Blake, E. Hornsby, A. Clarkin, A. Hogan, G. McRor., and L. Van der Steen. Miss Hornsby also shows a beautifully-painted fire screen, and Miss Van der Steen has a very artistically-constructed table of rope and plush with painted legs.

Miss Celia Kelly shows a table cover and Miss Agnes Clarkin a picture scarf, both of which are handsomely embroidered in silk. Miss Van der Steen exhibits a very pretty sofa cushion finished in satin and wool, and another attractive cushion made of silk and satin pieces is shown by Miss M. Kiggins. A beautiful embroidered banner is exhibited by Miss Van der Steen.

Handkerchief cases, handsomely embroidered and painted, are shown by Misses Josie Carroll, V. Macdonald and Florrie Blake. Miss Carroll also shows a handsome tea cosy in embroidered linen mounted with silk.

Prominent among the large assortment of drawn work that is displayed are two very pretty-embroidered side-board covers, the work of Miss Celia Kelly and Miss V. Macdonald.
