

Green Strongly Defends British Colonial Policy

UNITED NATIONS (CP) — External Affairs Minister Green of Canada Tuesday strongly defended British colonial policy and said he found it hard to understand the "bitter and unfair attacks" made on it.

In a policy speech before the members of the General Assembly, the Canadian minister rejected Soviet criticisms of British colonial developments and urged UN examination of areas under Soviet rule.

"We all know that there are difficulties to be overcome in some territories, but surely the United Kingdom's record of past accomplishment in this field justifies confidence in its intention to guide these people to independence," Green said.

The Soviet Union has painted quite another picture of these colonial developments, he added.

"Soviet spokesmen have chosen to disregard peaceful evolution in the Commonwealth and there freedom and independence have become a living reality for 600-

000,000 people since the Second World War."

Many millions in the Soviet bloc cannot exercise the right of self-determination which the Soviet government demands for others, the external affairs minister said.

"This denial of human rights and fundamental freedoms casts grave doubts on the Soviet Union's whole position on colonialism," he said.

Green discussed a wide range of world and UN problems in his policy statement, including Laos, the Congo, disarmament and UN financing.

On disarmament, he called on the assembly to "bring to bear the full force of world public opinion" to ensure more rapid progress.

He reiterated Canada's "firm opposition to all nuclear weapons testing" and backed Kef-Auvergne's proposal at the 17-nation Geneva disarmament conference for an end of all tests by Jan. 1, 1963.

On UN affairs, the Canadian minister urged that the financing of peace-keeping operations be placed on a solid foundation on the basis of collective responsibility.

He also called for wholehearted support of the acting UN secretary-general, U Thant, saying the Burmese diplomat has shown "great courage, patience and wisdom" during his interim term of office.

British Male Has New Fashion Look

LONDON — Striving box-pleated skirts, broad leather belting, fluffy blouses with charming suits of fine British woollens are featured in the autumn-winter collections. Colors are all bright even for the new knit-wear for men.

Simplicity and retaining always that understated elegance that will last naturally from one season to the next.

CLEAR COLORS

Emphasis is on clear colors for the autumn, with growing interest in camel and warm browns, and with subtle tweed mixtures a strong point.

The whole collection comprises of jersey wear, but such fantastic things can be done with British jersey, now a day's that one is never quite sure if one is looking at fine tweed, boucle wools or knitted fabrics. Double-knit jersey for suits is still a strong favorite with contrasting tops in jacquard or striped jersey.

Autumn shows many knitted dresses with high polo necks which hang straight and are loosely belted, as well as many versions of the Chanel suit with buttonless and collarless, jackets piped in velvet.

Many of the dresses, suits and jumpers suits are shown with separate matching scarves. Skirts are straight or gently flared or have a lovely swing when box-pleated all around.

Waistlines on dresses are emphasized by broad leather belts and are of the classic shirtwaist type, buttoned to, or just below the waist; but some times shown with a tie neckline instead of the more classic lapel.

RIBBED COATS

Heavy ribbed knitted coats which look like British tweeds are shown with matching schoolboy scarves and knitted hats.

For evening there is jersey with lurex either knitted into the fabric or used for trimmings around the neck and down the front fastening.

There are lovely color combinations such as emerald and midnight blue. Amber teamed with camel or green or black. Clear bright reds and a much more black and grey for day wear. Deep greens are shown with black in boucle jersey and red and black jacquard jersey are shown for larger sizes in suits with satin trimmings.

KNITTED MEN'S WEAR

Apart from classic fine British lambswool V-necked sweaters, the main interest is in the new men's wear range showing in London in heavy knits. Well round or V-necked sweaters these are outlined with very broad bands of fine ribbing. There is also a new neck-line shown, the chisel line: it is round at the back of the neck and finished with a broad band which stops at the side front. The front is squared off without a band, to make it ideal for wearing with shirts and ties.

Variations in ribbed styles, are most popular but there is also a cable and also a combination of black and one other color and also the row about which which a combination of two colors, white generally being one of them. Heavy knit cardigans have leather buttons and these are several folded knit-

lects. It is particularly smart with the hood down to form a soft cock neckline.

Colors running throughout the collection are predominantly soft. Harvest yellow, a soft mauve—old gold shade, gentle pinks and reds, luscious greens with some hyacinth blue which strikes a more vibrant note. Last, but perhaps the most important color this season is camel, camel in lambswool, camel for heavy knits and Shetlands.

Butter Sales Are Boosted

VICTORIA (CP) — Pierre Cote of Quebec City, president of the National Dairy Council of Canada, said that there has been an increase in butter consumption of about 3,000,000 pounds a month since the federal government dropped the retail price of butter by 12 cents in May.

Cote told 400 delegates to the opening session of the council's 45th annual three-day convention that the increased consumption has convinced all but the most skeptical that Canadians prefer to use butter in their homes.

Before the retail price was lowered, the dairy industry was faced with a situation where production was stimulated while consumption was depressed.
