## Rugby Highlights

The UPEI Rugby Panthers played three games over the October 12th weekend; the first team played Dalhousie and King's College, while the second team played Dal.

Dalhousie scored early and kept the pressure up when they played the Panther's first team. The final score was Dal. 32 - UPEI 6. Adam Cosquay scored two tries for Dal., while Bill Stoner, Ashley Redman and Doug Hartland all scored single tries. Tony Galevin scored on two penalty kicks for Dal. Todd McInnis scored UPEI's lone try. With the win, Dal. maintained their unbeaten season, while UPEI suffered their first loss.
