

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

CHICAGO, Dec. 8. The Inter-Ocean says: Mr. H. B. Porter, of 99 State street, states that Guitau told him two years ago that he intended to go to Washington and create a stir which would make his name famous all over the world.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Dec. 8.

Win. Burke alias Charles H. Page, has been arrested as the thief who stole \$117,000 worth of railroad bonds belonging to President D. P. Ellis, Commercial National Bank, Cleveland.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.

Senator Morrill took the floor and addressed the Senate at some length in support of the bill introduced by him on Monday in favor of the appointment of a committee to investigate the question of the tariff, and internal laws. The bill passed granting franking privilege to Mrs. Lucretia R. Garfield, and the Senate adjourned till Monday.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.

Jeff Davis arrived here yesterday on steamer "Neckar." He declined to talk politics and left for Kentucky in the evening.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.

It was stated this afternoon that Secretary Blaine had made known his desire to be relieved from the State Department at once; and that in accordance with the wishes of the President he will in the Senate name his successor to-morrow.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.

Composers in the Document Room, at the Government Printing Office, laid down their sticks yesterday afternoon and left the building, on account of the refusal of Mr. DeFrees, Government Printer, to allow them any longer the pay of 60 cents after midnight which they have hitherto received.

In Guitau's trial yesterday, the prosecution began the evidence in rebuttal to demolish the theory of insanity as set up for the defence. Gen. Sherman was the first witness, but his testimony was merely a recital of orders he issued at the time of the assassination. Other witnesses, including the family physician of Guitau's father, testified to their acquaintance with the family, and that they never noticed anything to indicate their insanity.

GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.

DUBLIN, Dec. 8.

Circulars have been issued authorizing constables in charge of stations to give private rewards for information leading to detection of persons intending to commit outrage. Informants name is never to be made public.

LONDON, Dec. 8.

The British barque "Sirio" from Bordeaux for Canada, was abandoned on the 4th inst. The crew arrived at Falmouth.

Easterley house in Wiltshire, an ancient country seat belonging to Sir John Astley, is totally burned. The loss is considerable.

DUBLIN, Dec. 8.

Parnell was taken suddenly ill yesterday with chills and shivering fits.

EUROPEAN.

VIENNA, Dec. 8, 9.30 p. m.

The Ring Theatre took fire at seven o'clock to-night, just before the beginning of the Opera. The fire was caused by the fall of a lamp on the stage. The house was tolerably full, and the loss of life is very great. Seventy bodies have been recovered. Many persons are injured. The greatest efforts were made to save life. The scene was terrible.

VIENNA, 11 p. m.

One hundred and forty five bodies have been brought out of the theatre, but the dead therein are still numerous, many bodies having been consumed in the galleries and other elevated parts of the building. The rapidity of the flames prevented people from taking advantage of the ordinary exits. Only a small proportion of the audience saved themselves; which they did by leaping from windows three stories high into cloths held below.

MIDNIGHT.

Taking out of bodies from the Theatre continues. It is estimated that three hundred persons have perished. Some bodies are fearfully disfigured. Several persons were injured in springing from the windows of the Theatre. Among the missing are Herr Fife, Court Musical Director, and Herr Helmsperger. Most of the bodies have been identified as those of tradesmen and minor officials. On the spreading of the news of the disaster the performances at the other theatres stopped.

LONDON, Dec. 8.

The "Standard's" Vienna despatch says: It is estimated that the audience in the theatre numbered two thousand. Many persons were trampled to death in the panic which ensued. As soon as the fire was seen there was an explosion of gas and the audience were plunged in darkness.

PARIS, Dec. 8.

The Committee on Bills for sale of Crown Jewels, inspected them yesterday; proposed to retain assortment including certain presents from foreign monarchs, and swords valued at 250,000 francs and possessing artistic value. The committee also declined to sell regent diamond, fearing it would be bought by enterprising Americans for exhibition. They are in favor of disposing of diamonds to the value of 12,000,000 francs and possessing no historical value.
