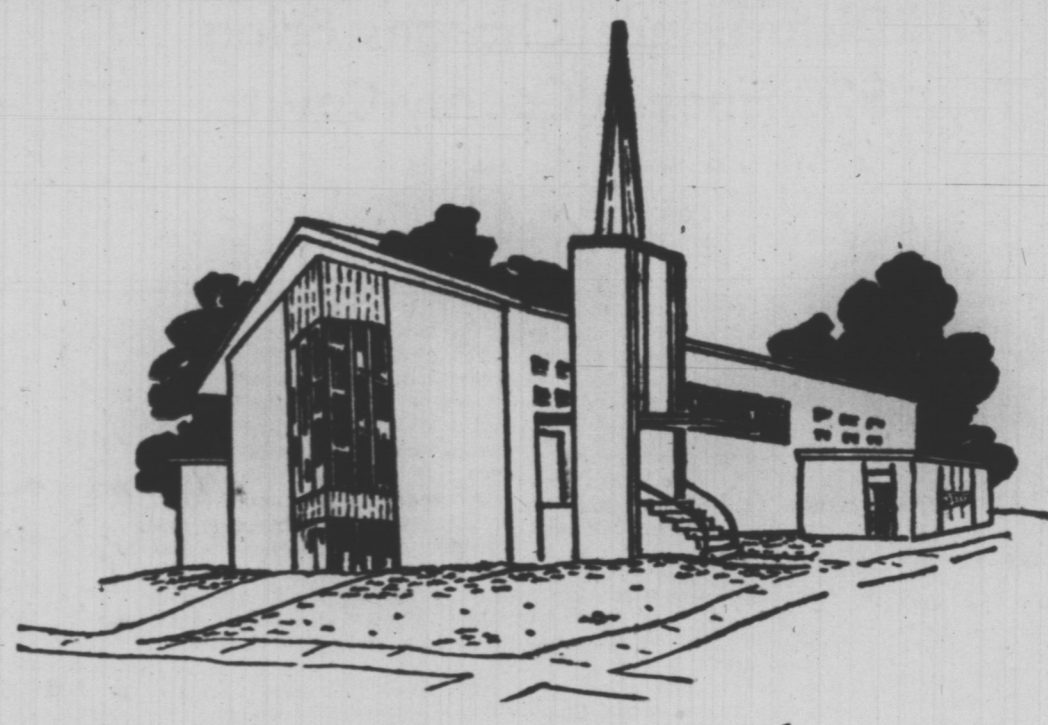

TODAYS TREAT

FISH SCALLOP
1 small onion
1 cup crabmeat
1 cup celery
1 cup shrimp
1 cup lobster
1 cup tuna
1 1/2 cups mayonnaise
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
1/2 tsp. Worcester sauce
1 cup buttered crumbs
Bake in oven 350 degrees for 20 minutes.

Medium White Sauce for Fish:
2 tbs. butter
2 tbs. flour
1 cup milk
Salt and pepper.

Method: Melt the butter add the dry flour and mix well. Then add the milk gradually. Season and bring to boiling point. Cook until thick.

AGREE ON CONTRACT
SUDBURY, Ont. (CP) — A contract between Falconbridge Nickel Mines and Local 598 of the International Union of Mine Mill and Smelter Workers (Ind.) has been approved by a 2-to-1 majority. It was announced Wednesday. The three-year contract, almost the same as that accepted last December by International Nickel Company employees at the end of a three-month strike was accepted by 1,164 union members with 556 in opposition.
