company at Oakwood, Ontario. The same panel of speakers spoke to a group of Island farmers last night in the Prince County Vocational School at Summerside.

The seeding year is the most important in any forage program. Dr. MacLeod, a former Grandview boy, told the meeting. "Grasses and legumes should be used in any mixture. If legumes should winterkill, he advised, you will have the grasses to produce the crop, he advised. LITTLE SENSE There's little sense using expensive seed and costly hours of labor on seeding—the cost will run to \$35, he suggested—if there isn't enough lime and fertilizer to ensure that the crop will grow. Dr. MacLeod emphasized, too, that the needed application of lime, to correct the pH factor, will increase tremendously the effect of fertilizer applications. It is little use, he explained, in applying fertilizer if the soil is too acid for the crop that is intended.

Lime, he explained, is a capital investment; it is essential for good forage. Establishment on acid soils. Its use is most efficient, he said, to bring the pH factor to the soil above 5.5 to 6.0. Soluble aluminum may be present in toxic amounts in soils where the pH is below 5.5. Lime to increase the factor above that figure and the aluminum becomes harmless, he advised. Select the best drained fields for the establishment of alfalfa, or alfalfa-grass mixtures, he told the group. It is wasteful to plant alfalfa—its roots go as deep as 25 inches—or other deep-rooted species on poorly drained soils. Timothy, bidfoot, trefoil, and clover can be planted on moderately drained soils. Seeding early maturing species on well-drained soils, and later maturing species on poorly-drained soils will improve forage quality it was stated.

Phosphorus is important in the seeding year, potassium must be in adequate supply and "plan to continue fertilization at least annually," he advised "to maintain the high yielding species in the forage mixture."

**SPECIAL WARNING** Do not spread manure on top of a new seeding, he warned. And there was a special warning about not allowing cattle to graze on alfalfa during the months of September and October. "Careless fall management can wipe out a well established forage stand," Dr. MacLeod warned.

Mr. Rothwell discussed suitable forage species, seed varieties and mixtures. Mr. LeLachur talked on the pros and cons of a nurse crop and Mr. Saunders, talked on seed bed preparation, inoculations and seeding machines. One warning that was emphasized was to use twice the quantity of inoculant the manu-

**UNIVERSITY AMALGAMATION URGED BY KINGS SPEAKER** Arthur MacDonald (L-5th Kings) speaking yesterday morning on the budget debate in the Legislative Assembly said, "I think the time has come when we should put our religious differences aside."

The statement was made in reference to a request by Mr. MacDonald that a further study be conducted regarding the amalgamation of St. Dunstan's and Prince of Wales into a single university.

Mr. MacDonald criticized the government for confusion in its tourist pamphlets and for not promoting Kings County adequately in the tourist literature. He expressed his disappointment that Dundas, Cardigan and Annandale would not be serviced by the proposed all-weather road which will run to Souris and to Georgetown.

Mr. MacDonald requested the minister of highways to pave certain roads in his district and complained of the lack of paving done in 5th Kings last year. He requested that the government pay half the interest charges on the loans of farmers received from the Farm Credit Corporation. He said that this is a practice followed by both the governments of New Brunswick and Quebec.

He told A.B. MacRae, minister of agriculture, he was sorry that his department had not received a larger share of the provincial budget. Mr. MacDonald complained of the lack of adequate staff for the Cardigan liquor store and also of the fact that construction had not begun for the new

liquor store though the land for it had been purchased some time ago.

### SNAP VOTE IS NO JOKE

TORONTO (CP)—For the first time since it was elected with a lopsided majority in 1963, Ontario's Conservative government was defeated on a vote in the legislature Friday.

It was no April fool's joke to Conservative whip John White (PC—London South), who had allowed the government side to dwindle to 10 members from the normal 76. The combined Liberal and New Democratic opposition had 47 of their 30 members in the house when NDP Leader Donald C. MacDonald suddenly realized the government was outnumbered.

Mr. MacDonald moved that the committee of supply, debating the estimates of the department of labor, rise and report progress. A motion that would, if carried, usurp the government's control of the House.

To everyone's surprise the chairman of the committee Leonard Reilly (PC—Eglington), ruled in favor of the opposition on a voice vote. The Conservatives called immediately for a recorded vote and won, naturally, 36 to 22, after the division bells had called in the members.

Mr. MacDonald's caper had been tried before, but it was the first time a Conservative house chairman had ruled against his own party. Barry Williams, Summerside went out of control and struck a telephone pole on Summer Street opposite to Summerside High School. Damage to the Williams vehicle was estimated to be \$100. A 1966 Plymouth driven by Cyrus DesRoches, Summerside, collided with a 1962 Ford driven by Louis Mott, at approximately 5 p.m. at the corner of Spring and Water Streets. Total damage to both vehicles was \$150. There were no injuries reported in all accidents.
