# ORPHANAGE DEPENDING ON UNITED FUND Sisters of Martha Provide Homes For The Homeless

(Editor's note: This is the start in a series of articles as organizations taking part in the province-wide United Fund Campaign.)

The plight of a homeless child has always made a special appeal to kind hearts.

For 52 years now the Sisters of Martha at St. Vincent's Orphanage have made a home for children who have no mother or father, or whose parents are unable to care for them.

The prime function of the institution is "to provide, with vigilant attention, the every need of the neglected and homeless children." In the current year the orphanage has housed 42 children, giving them 11,500 days of care.

Costs for the children and medical expenses for the upkeep of the orphanage buildings and grounds the institution needs \$11,200 of the \$27,487 sought in the United Fund campaign.

Despite living in an orphanage the children are able to enjoy many activities that they would undergo in ordinary circumstances. Along with their schooling they are able to enjoy instruction in music, swimming and dancing.

Several of them have been and are members of Girl Guides, Boy Scouts and Cubs, and consequently, enjoy the city's camping in the summer.

The Sisters also visit many of the children who have gone to other homes and frequently pay for their clothing. A fully equipped children's playroom is a dream of the Sisters of St. Martha at the orphanage.

When the Grey Nuns or Sisters of Charity left Prince Edward Island in 1929 the care of the orphans was assumed by the Sisters of St. Martha. "Life is not so happy without a substitute home."

The Sisters of Charity of Quebec came to staff the new home and welcomed the many children brought to them, though the problem of providing food and clothing for the family, more than 100, were very great.

# Retired CNR Agent Dies

Wilfred Wood, 74, retired CNR station agent, died Thursday evening in the Charlottetown Hospital after an illness of two weeks.

A native of Kelly's Cross, he had resided for the last eight years in Charlottetown, after his retirement from the CNR in 1955. Following his retirement, he was station agent for the Evening Patriot from 1954 until 1958.

He served as CNR agent at Port Hill for 20 years, until 1929 when he moved to Georgetown. He was station agent there until his retirement 15 years later.

He is survived by one son and four daughters: Alexa, Leamington, Ont.; Lorraine, Mrs. L. D. Doolittle, Ont.; Vivian, Mrs. J.A. Coleman, Toronto; Ellen, Toronto; and Margaret, with the Canadian National Telegraphs at Charlottetown.

His wife, the former Margaret Kelly, of Stanchfield, died last year. His remains are resting at his late residence, 23 Sydney St., from where the funeral will be held Monday morning with Requiem High Mass at St. Dunstan's Basilica at nine o'clock.
