CANADIANS IN MASSACHUSETTS.—The Boston correspondent of the Halifax Herald says: It is estimated that in this State there are 260,000 persons who were born in Canada. According to Horace G. Malin, the statistician of the commonwealth, there are more Canadians in Boston than any other town. Fall River is a good second. According to the official figures, issued by the state, Boston has 6,909 natives of New Brunswick, 14,712 natives of Nova Scotia, 3,158 natives of Prince Edward Island, 16,287 natives of other Canadian provinces, of which 14,452 are English speaking, and 1,385 French. Fall River has 17,079 French-Canadians born in Canada, exclusive of the Maritime provinces, and 845 speaking the English tongue. That city has only 84 natives of New Brunswick, 23 Nova Scotians and 125 from P. E. I. The natives of those provinces outside of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. I., are largely French Canadians, most of whom are employed in the cotton mills.

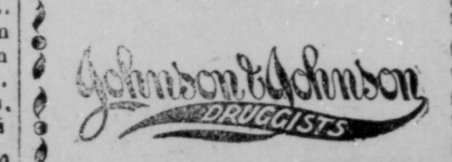

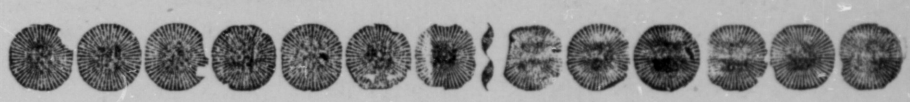
