PREPARATIONS AT HALIFAX.

Soldiers to be Sent to
Newfoundland.

A BATTERY OF ARTILERY TO
GO TO ESQUIMALT.

Halifax to be Garrisoned by Royal
Canadians.

HALIFAX, Nov 5.—It is understood that 200 men of the Leinster regiment have been held in readiness to go to Newfoundland. A battery of artillery for Esquimalt is another projected move.

In the event of a move taking place, the Royal Canadians from Fredericton will do garrison duty in Halifax.

The Pilgrim's Progress.

JERUSALEM, Nov. 5.—The Emperor and Empress of Germany embarked on board for Jaffa this morning amid the firing of salutes from the guns of the "Fess" and the cheering of large crowds of people. Their majesties declared they were greatly pleased with their visit.

JAFFA, Nov. 4.—The Emperor and Empress of Germany and their suites on board Imperial yacht Hohenzollern started for Beyroute in the evening.

Gone Into Liquidation.

CHICAGO, Nov 4.—The Bank of Commerce, a state bank, with \$500,000 capital and \$1,000,000 deposits, have voted to go into voluntary liquidation. Its deposits and an equal amount of its bills receivable will be taken over by the Union National Bank. The affairs of the Bank of Commerce will be wound up by its directors and proceeds paid to its stockholders.

Damage to Manitoba Crops.

WINNIPEG, Man., Nov 4.—The Hon. Thomas Greenway says it is impossible to give anything like an exact estimate of the damage done to crops. However, the loss will be serious enough. The Hon. Robert Watson thinks twenty-five per cent of the crop will be wet, and more or less damaged. The Hon. Mr. Meikle speaks hopefully of the yield, and the condition of grain along the Northwestern Railway. The damage has been greater than the millers would have people believe.

Insurance Up.

MONTREAL, Nov. 4.—In view of the serious estrangement between Great Britain and France, and the possibility of war resulting therefrom, the marine underwriters have decided to raise the rate of insurance to a war basis. The rate of insurance on British cargoes will be from 1-8 to 1-4 per cent, and that on French cargoes about 2 per cent.

STEAMER BURNED.

Nearly a Great Disaster.

VINEYARD HAVNE, Nov. 5.—A disaster, fortunately with the small loss of life of five persons in all, was made known to-day by the landing here of twenty-two persons who escaped from the burning Steamer Croatan, of the Clyde Line, bound from New York for Wilmington.

The disaster occurred eighteen miles north of Cape Charles, from which port the steamer sailed with a general cargo and eight passengers.

At three o'clock the burned hulk of the big freighter sank beneath the waves, but of twenty seven persons who were on board her twenty two have survived the very tragic experience.

Sad Drowning Accident.

NORTH SYDNEY, Nov. 5.—News has been received here of a drowning accident at Bird Island fishing station near Big Bras d'or, on Tuesday last, when two brothers, Stewart and Howard Richardson, of Owls Head, Halifax county lost their lives. The men were out mackerel fishing and were returning to the Island when their boat was struck by a heavy sea and capsized only forty yards from shore. Stewart leaves a wife and nine children. Howard was 24 years of age and unmarried.

What About Anticosti?

MONTREAL, Nov 4.—The imperial government has seized the gravity of the situation at Anticosti, and has cabled to Canada asking for a report upon and explanation of the sale of so important a strategic point as Anticosti to a subject of a foreign power. Attorney General Archambault has received a request from Ottawa for a report upon the whole subject, the Government having received a most pressing despatch from the colonial office asking for it. Mr. Chamberlain sees the danger of a French post at the mouth of the St. Lawrence.

RILEY'S FIRST HIT

James Whitcomb Riley began his career in a newspaper office in Anderson, Ind., by writing humorous rhymes as "advertising locals"—"doggerel" he called them. At the same time he wrote many rhymes with the serious intention of having them, if possible, recognized as poems. But he could not get them published. Even compositions whose worth he had tested—those that "would please people when I'd stand up and read 'em to them"—would be returned promptly by every magazine to which he offered them for publication. The Hoosier dialect was too "low down" for the average magazine editor.

Finally in a freak of boyish indignation, to prove that what editors really wanted was not originality, but imitation, he devised the scheme of writing a poem in imitation of Poe and of palming it off on the public as a real poem of Poe's recently discovered. The scheme was very skillfully planned and very deftly executed and successful beyond anything the clever deviser of it had ever dreamed. From one end of the country to the other "Leonanie" was hailed as a veritable "find," a bit of genius' most genuine ore. Riley had his revenge. He had some trouble, however, in proving that he was not an intentional forger.

He lost his newspaper position, but he immediately got another and a better one—the Indianapolis Journal. "Come and get pay for your work," said Judge Martindale, the editor. The turn in the tide had come. Soon appeared, in 1883, "The Old Swinamin Hole and 'Leven More Poems." Indiana recognized her own. The "Hoosier Poet" was acclaimed by his compatriots everywhere. But when in 1886 the volume in prose and verse appeared, "The Boss Girl and Other Stories," James Whitcomb Riley became a name as well known in one state as in another.—Chicago Record.

THE CONTINUED WAR PREPARATIONS

Cause Serious Uneasiness in England.

NOTWITHSTANDING LORD SALISBURY'S FAVORABLE ANNOUNCEMENT

Regarding the Settlement of the
Fashoda Question.

LONDON, Nov 5.—Despite the jubilation of the country over the favorable announcement by Lord Salisbury regarding Fashoda, at the Kitchener banquet, there is serious uneasiness as to the real object of the continued war preparations, which can hardly be justified even by Lord Salisbury's warning that there are still matters in dispute with France.

The Mails Contract.

OTTAWA, Nov 5.—The contract for the winter service is still hung up.

The government is resisting the claims of the Allan and Dominion lines.

The deputation representing the companies cleared out again this afternoon with nothing done. The Government is getting tired of delay and may hand the service over to the Beaver Line.

DISTILLED SPIRITS.

Big Purchase by British Government.

CHICAGO, Nov 4.—The British government has closed a contract here for immediate delivery of 125,000 gallons of distilled spirits at Montreal. An intimation was also given that about 450,000 gallons would be ordered in ten days. This order of 125,000 gallons amounts to nearly 3,000 barrels, and will require over sixty cars for its transportation. The distilled spirits thus ordered will be used in the manufacture of smokeless powder.

Republicans Want Rank.

LONDON, Nov 4.—The Vienna correspondent of the Standard says that official negotiations are about to be opened between United States and Turkey to raise their ministers to the rank of ambassador.

THE PEACE COMMISSION.

Position Taken by The Spaniards

LONDON, Nov. 4.—The Paris correspondent of the Times, who repudiates as "calumnious" charges of hostility toward the United States contained in letters he has been receiving from Americans for some time, says:

"I understand that at tomorrow's (Friday) sitting, the Spanish commissioners will reply textually as follows: 'It is impossible for us either to accept or refuse the conditions the United States impose. We do not desire to declare a formal rupture, because it would oblige Europe to run the risk of beholding the humiliating spectacle of an American fleet bombarding European shores.'

'We do not intend to furnish America with a pretext for the realization of such an act; but we cannot subscribe to distasteful conditions which are not in conformity with the stipulations adopted in common in the agreement that terminated the war.'

'We withdraw because we do not feel we have a right to sign the abdication sought to be imposed upon us.'

We withdraw, leaving public conscience and history to judge the act of violence of which we are the object, and although we are unfortunately convinced that our attitude will have no effect upon the minds of our conquerors, we cannot assume any other, because, by accepting the conditions imposed, we should become accomplices in an injustice and violation of international law, to which we may submit, but in which it is impossible to ask us to take any share of responsibility."

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 4.—The Novosti commenting upon the United States determination to claim the Philippines, says: "The great powers can, like Spain, protest against the proposed cession, as several of them are indirectly interested in the maintenance of the status quo. In an extreme case, the question should be arbitrated."

BERLIN, Nov. 4.—The German papers express their feeling very frankly. The Hamburgische Correspondenz says:—The United States are conducting the peace negotiations as they conducted the war. The mask of humanity is being gradually dropped, revealing the brutal hand of strength. When the protocol was signed not a foot of Philippine soil was in American hands. President McKinley demands the complete surrender only because victory in the forthcoming elections depends upon it. The American demand, however, is less a blow to Spain than to the European powers, which seem desirous of selecting naval stations in the Philippines.
