

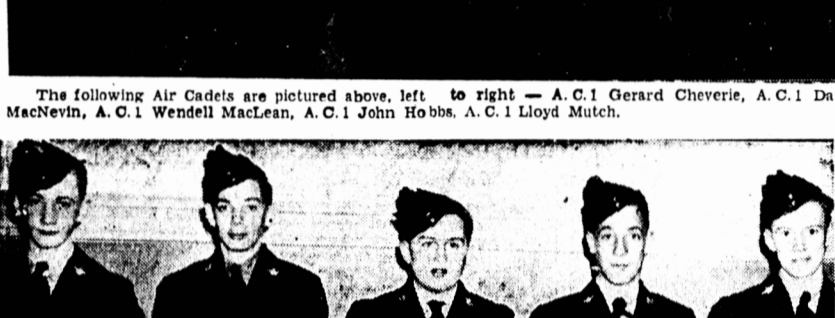

Manchester United Wins Soccer League

LONDON, April 27 — (Reuters) — Manchester United Saturday won the English League soccer championship for the first time since 1911 by swamping Arsenal, its nearest rival, 6-1.

United, which has been runner-up four times since the war, went on the field at Manchester knowing its London rival would have to win 7-0 to gain the league title. Arsenal, finalist in the soccer cup—a separate competition—against Newcastle next Saturday, saw the end of all hopes of the rare "double"—league leadership and the cup—eight minutes after play.

Jack Rowley, star Manchester forward, then slammed home the first goal of the game. This made United's goal average so superior that Arsenal would have needed a basketball score to win.

United won the championship by a margin of four points, gaining 57 points from 42 games by scoring 95 goals and conceding 52.

Manchester United will leave England April 30 for a 12-day tour of Canada and the United States.

Arsenal finished the league season with 53 points after scoring 80 goals to 61 against, but Tottenham Hotspur's 2-0 victory over Blackpool threatens to displace it from second spot.

Tottenham, last year's champion, has 51 points and a game in hand—against Chelsea next Wednesday. A victory would put it ahead of Arsenal on superior goal-average.

At the other end of the table, Fulham beat Huddersfield 1-0 but both go down into the second division with 25 and 28 points respectively.

Stoke City's 3-1 win over Manchester City carried the team one point ahead of Huddersfield to avoid relegation.

With Sheffield Wednesday assured leader at 53 points in the second division, the final choice of

which team will accompany it to the first division rests with Cardiff. Birmingham City occupies second place with 51 points but Cardiff, though two points behind, has a game in hand. If the Welsh team wins against Leeds next week, it will oust Birmingham from second place on superior goal-average.

Queen's Park Rangers and Coventry were the unlucky pair at the foot of the table. Both lost again Saturday and will be shunted to the third division.

In the third division (Southern) already won by Plymouth, Reading gained second spot, though beaten 2-0 by Walsall today. Reading has 59 points—six behind Plymouth's Brighton, its nearest rival, lost to Exeter 2-0. With one match remaining to be played, Reading and Brighton are separated by two points but Reading has the additional advantage of a much better goal average.

Liverpool Plans Senior Ball Team

LIVERPOOL, N. S., April 25—(CP)—Garfield Killam, president of Liverpool Baseball Club, said today Larrupers will definitely field a team in the Halifax and District senior loop this season.

Killam, commenting on reports that Larrupers might drop out of the import-packed league, said Liverpool will be back with a strong squad.

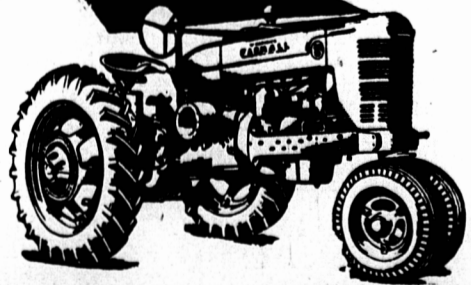
