P.E.I. Regiment Begins Exercise 'Prim Light'

Approximately 150 officers, NCO's, and men of the Prince Edward Island Regiment will move into the field this afternoon for a one-day exercise that has been given the code name "Prim Light".

The exercise will see the unit deployed in a reconnaissance role, and it will mark the resumption of corps training for the regiment for the first time since it undertook Civil Defence training several years ago.

Coat Of Arms To Be Replaced By Leaf Symbol

Lt. Col. E. G. MacLeod, officer commanding the P.E.I.R., said last night that Saturday afternoon will be devoted to driver testing, field craft, and obstacle course competitions for squadrons which will include river crossing, barrier crossing, etc.

The exercise itself, which will get underway at 8.45 Sunday morning, will simulate conditions of the arrival of a small enemy force, heavily armed, landed in the Point Prim area by submarines and fishing trawlers. A reconnaissance squadron will be deployed to handle the enemy force.

The Conservatives immediately branded the announcement a "disgrace."
