### O Negative Blood Donors Sought By PEI Red Cross

As the result of the special appeal launched by the Charlottetown Red Cross blood donor committee when clinics were held in the city in late April, there was an increase of over 20 per cent in the number of O. Rh. Negative donors registered. Normally, out of the 1,273 registered there would be about 77 but 99 of this type of donor attended the clinics.

Up until April of this year at Red Cross blood donor clinics held in this province no special effort had been made to collect blood according to type or Rh factor. In other words, the law of averages had been depended upon to ensure that blood of the proper type is always available for those who require it. However, because

of the fact that group O, Rh Negative blood do be given to any person regardless of type, it is required in proportionately greater quantities. It is used in emergencies where there is not time to test or cross-match a person's blood. This has happened on several occasions in P.E.I.

This has created a situation where there will be adequate quantities of the other types of blood on the shelves, but no group O, Rh Negative. To help overcome this situation and strengthen the whole program of having blood always available when needed, it has become necessary to make a special appeal to all O negative donors to attend. This effort will be continued at all blood donor clinics being held in P.E.I. in the future. The next series will take place in Prince County this coming week and will provide an opportunity for O Negative donors in that area to respond to the appeal, and for those who do not yet know whether or not they have O Negative blood to find out by attending.

### NORMAL BIRTH CONTINUES TO AMAZE

## Shepherd Family Awaiting First Glimpse Of Brother

MONTAGUE—Preparations are underway at the James Shepherd home at Cardigan, where the eight Shepherd children and their father are eagerly anticipating the first glimpse of their famous baby brother, William Preston, and the homecoming of their equally famous mother, who by natural methods, gave birth to the perfectly normal 16 pound, 4 1/2

babies, said that it was a natural birth of the biggest baby in his entire medical career.

The rarity of a normal birth of an infant of so great a weight is comparable to the birth of Siamese twins, and is almost unheard of in medical history.

Dr. Elizabeth Wiley, leading obstetrician and gynaecologist at Toronto's Women's College, says the normal birth of a child weighing 16 pounds would be "most unusual." She has delivered thousands of babies, the heaviest 13 pounds.

The father, James Shepherd, was born at Cardigan and is a painter by trade. His mother was the former Florence Fougere of West Arichat, Cape Breton. They were married in 1942 and lived in Halifax for a short time.

Messages and gifts from many sources are beginning to arrive for both mother and son.

Five of the eight Shepherd children whose ages are from 14 to 2 years, attend school. The three youngest are at home. The oldest child, Shirley, is acting as homemaker in the absence of their mother.

The staff of the small Kings County Hospital is being kept busy by a steady flow of visitors who call to see the young lad and his mother, and who on leaving, wonder who is more proud—the mother or the staff members who vie with each other for the opportunity of caring for the handsome dark haired boy.

Members of the medical profession will have no doubt of the authenticity of this birth after reading the comments of the attending physician, Dr. Preston MacIntyre, who with 35 years of experience, during which he delivered between 5,000 and 7,000

### Former Island Minister Is Final Conference Speaker

"The root cause of all our difficulty is grounded in the fact that we have forgotten God and left him out. We need to sing again with Kipling: 'Lord God of Hosts be with us yet—lest we forget!'" These words were spoken by the Rev. George M. Young of Fredericton, guest preacher at the final meeting of the 1959 session of the Maritime Conference.

Speaking in Sackville United Church on the theme "Yesterday, Today, and Tomorrow," Dr. Young presented an earnest challenge to the young women being designated as deaconesses and commissioned as missionaries. Using the biblical text, "The things that are seen are transient, but the things that are unseen are eternal," he drew a comparison between life in the Victorian era and life today. "While the pomp of this age has passed away," he said, "the unseen spiritual things are just as valid as ever." Few men could judge the era as accurately as the 92-year-old cleric.

Dr. Young served as Pastor of First Methodist Church, Charlottetown (now Trinity United) from 1900 to 1904. Conducting the final conference service was the president, Rev. A. Frank MacLean of Charlottetown. Assisting were Rev. George Russell, Sackville, who read the scripture, and Rev. D. K. MacLeod, Sussex, who led in prayer. Both men entered the ministry in Stellerton during Dr. Young's pastorate there.

During the service two young women Miss Jean Windsor, B.A., and Miss Helene Manning were designated deaconesses of the United Church of Canada. Miss Windsor is the daughter of Rev. Carter Windsor, Donkton, N.B. U., former girl's work secretary. She is a graduate of Mt. Allison of the M.R.E.C., and has just completed two years in the United Church Training School, Toronto. Miss Manning, a native of Bathurst, is a graduate of Teacher's College, Fredericton, and the United Church Training School. Taking part in the designation service were Rev. Carter Windsor father of one of the deaconesses, and Rev. Willard Picketts, who presented the candidates. Mr. Picketts, assistant secretary of Conference, is a native of Wilmet Valley, P.E.I.

Following this, a service for "the sending forth of missionaries," was held.
