HMCS Labrador, the RCN's new Arctic patrol ship, is now well into the second half of a historic voyage which, when completed, will have seen the 6,500-ton vessel completely circumnavigate the North American continent. She made history by being the first warship to smash her way from east to west through the fabled, ice-packed Northwest Passage in Canada's vast Arctic region. Commanded by Capt. O. C. S. Robertson, of Montreal and Halifax, the Labrador left Halifax July 23, and reached Esquimalt, B. C., September 27. She is now returning to Halifax via the Panama Canal, and due at her home port late in November. Books of reference are handy things for anybody, and especially for Naval writers. FAY CARMEN GLOVER

On the evening of September 15th, 1954 the death occurred, while in the course of duty, of Carmen Glover. Mr. Glover had been in the employ of the Canadian National Railway for over 35 years and at the time of his passing was the Conductor in charge of the Murray Harbour Southbound train. His passing was as shocking as it was sudden to his family and very wide circle of friends which he had gained through the years. Kindness, generosity and goodwill such as the late Mr. Glover expressed at all times is not something lost to the attention of friends and loved ones. Rather it stands as a symbol of Christian grace while they live and as a monument to them forever when they are dead. Indeed there is an emptiness in the home and the hearts of the many who knew and loved him.

Mr. Glover was a veteran of the First World War 1914-1918 and was with the "105" serving in the Canadian army overseas for the duration. The Canadian Legion performed the Military committal at the graveside.

A very large host of friends of Charlottetown and Mt. Stewart acquaintance attended the services as they expressed their sincere sympathy to the bereaved wife and family. There are left to mourn besides his mother, Mrs. S. C. Clark, Mt. Stewart, one sister, Mrs. Howard Court, Taber, Alberta; and brothers, Guy in Charlottetown and Wendell at Mt. Stewart; five children by his first wife, Carmen and Howard, Mrs. Goetz, Mrs. Hornsbury and Mrs. MacPhee. He is also survived by his wife Adele Glover and five little girls, Rena, Joyce, Judy, Dianne and George-Ann.

His funeral was held from the MacLean Funeral home, Rev. Marvel D. Dunbar, Central Christian Church conducted the service and music was provided by members of the Choir. Interment took place in the Mt. Stewart Cemetery. Pallbearers were all fellow employees of the deceased.

In concluding words of comfort the Minister spoke thus: "God is too wise to err, too kind to hurt. His reason must be good. Christ—the Mind that Knows, the heart that cares, the power that is available."
